2013 SEASON

ROUND 1

SOUTH Fremantle gave it a big shake in the first half against reigning premier Claremont but in the end went down by 48 points after scores were level at half-time with last year's Bernie Naylor Medallist Ben Saunders going down injured.

Mitch Banner, Sean Lynch, Warrick Andreoli, Kingsley Smith and Tom Vandeleur all made their league debuts.

Sean Tighe was the best with 22 possessions, 22 hit outs and two goals with captain Ryan Cook working hard to gather 24 possessions, Kris Miller 23 and Anthony Collica was lively. Banner was watched closely by Byron Schammer but had 19 possessions and three goals.

The reserves went down by 51 points while the colts also started the day narrowly going down by two points.

ROUND 3

SOUTH Fremantle completely dominated the first quarter and led Perth by 19 points at quarter-time, and it could have been more, but fell 26 points down by midway through the last term before eventually losing by 13.

Miller picked up a team-high 27 possessions with Cook gathering 19, defender Adam McIntosh 18, Jacob Martinez 17, Reece Adams 16, Mitch Carter 15 and Toby Bairstow 15.

Tighe outpointed Christian Eyres and Mitchell Lleyendekkers, and finished with 13 possessions, eight marks and 20 hit outs.

Paul Mugambwa had 12 possessions and seven marks to go with his three goals up forward with Banner and Adam Guglielmana kicking three goals each.

The reserves narrowly went down by 13 points despite Kaiden Matera kicking three goals and the colts scored a resounding 68-point win with Ben Sokol and Blaine Johnson booting four goals, and Cameron McCarthy and Matthew Ah Siu three.

ROUND 4

THE Bulldogs lost a thriller to West Perth at Fremantle Oval on Friday night by just three points.

After falling 32 points down by early in the second quarter, South Fremantle showed terrific fight and spirit to get back into the contest with five of the last seven goals of the first half, and then three goals to nil in the third quarter to suddenly be in front by three quarter-time but West Perth just got over the line.

Guglielmana finished with four clever goals with Winter adding three while Miller continued his outstanding start to the 2013 season racking up another 26 possessions with Haiden Schloithe playing a terrific game with 22 disposals and Toby Bairstow also had it 22 times.

On Saturday, the colts cruised to an 18.7 (115) to 5.11 (41) victory and the reserves also ran out 14.14 (98) to 12.7 (79) victors.

ROUND 5

THE Bulldogs came out looking terrific in the first quarter at home to Subiaco kicking four of the first five goals to lead by 17 points late in the opening term, but Subiaco got on top after that to run out 16.17 (113) to 10.12 (72) winners.

Banner tried hard racking up 32 possessions while Cook had 30 disposals, Miller 24 (and two goals), Schloithe 23, defender Craig White 23, Bairstow 22 and Tighe 19 to go with five marks and 29 hit outs.

Meanwhile, the reserves put in a good performance earlier in the day beating Subiaco 14.6 (90) to 8.8 (56) led by dropped duo McIntosh and Martinez while the colts lost by 26 points.

ROUND 6

AGAIN one quarter cost South Fremantle with Swan Districts taking advantage in the second term to end up beating the Bulldogs by 21 points at Steel Blue Oval after the Bulldogs kicked the game's first three goals.

Kingsley Smith made the most of his limited opportunities kicking three goals from just five kicks and four marks. John Sgherza also continued to gather some form and fitness coming back from injury with 13 touches, four tackles and three goals.

Miller was missing his first game since joining the Bulldogs and a host of players stepped up including Cook who had 28 possessions, Banner with 23, Bairstow 23, Schloithe 22, Mitch Carter 22 and promising young defender Jason Maskos 20.

South Fremantle's reserves lost a nail-biter with Swan Districts ending up winning 12.5 (77) to 10.14 (74) and the colts prevailed in another tight affair beating Swan Districts 8.11 (59) to 8.6 (54).

ROUND 7

SOUTH Fremantle and East Fremantle paid tribute to Anzac Day with a crowd of 5120 turning out to Fremantle Oval, but it was the Sharks who prevailed by 29 points.

Banner was outstanding in his best performance for the Bulldogs with 34 possessions, five marks, eight tackles, five inside 50s and two goals.

Sgherza showed why he was so missed in the early rounds after an injury-interrupted pre-season getting the better of state defender Andrew Stephen, and kicking four goals.

Cook had 29 possessions, Miller 26, Bairstow 25, Schloithe 21 and Tighe worked hard in the ruck having the better of his battle against East Fremantle pair Cameron Symonds and Fraser MacDougall.

The reserves got the day off to a perfect start for South Fremantle winning 14.8 (92) to 11.9 (75).

ROUND 8

THE Bulldogs were hunting for their first win of the 2013 season and dominated the majority of the first half against the Royals to lead by 29 points at half-time. However, East Perth hit back in the third quarter kicking seven goals to two to head into the final term with a two-point advantage.

The Bulldogs again went up a gear, though, and two of the first three goals of the final quarter had South Fremantle 14 points up again at the 17-minute mark but East Perth kicked the last five goals to end up 18.13 (121) to 14.18 (102) winners.

Banner continued his outstanding form for the Bulldogs finishing with 32 possessions and two goals. Bairstow also gathered 25 disposals, Cook 22 and two goals, Miller 19, Nick Borovac 18, Martinez 18 and Winter 18.

Tighe worked tremendously hard in the ruck up against giant East Perth pair Paul Johnson and Scott Lycett with 21 possessions, 22 hit outs, six inside 50s and five clearances.

The reserves went down to East Perth by 16 points with the colts starting the day at Leederville on a winning note beating East Perth by nine points.

ROUND 9

ASHTON Hams and Ben Saunders returned to add some bite to South Fremantle's forward-line and combined for seven goals to help the Bulldogs to their first win of the season over Peel.

South Fremantle beat Peel Thunder by 15 points at Fremantle Oval to bring up the Bulldogs' first four points in an impressive display against a side coming off some good recent form themselves.

Hams and Saunders were the stars up forward with South Fremantle with West Coast's Hams playing his first WAFL game of the season and kicking four goals from 24 possessions and eight marks.

Saunders played his first game since breaking his collarbone in Round 1 against Claremont and kicked three goals from six kicks, but did break his collarbone again after half-time.

Tighe dominated with 31 possessions, seven marks, 33 hit outs and four entries inside-50 in an outstanding performance with Miller racking up 34 possessions, Cook 27 to go with his two goals, Banner 27, Bairstow 26, Sam Lowrie 23, Shannon Burnett 22 and Martinez 19 to go with nine tackles.

Not only did South Fremantle's league side win on Saturday, but so did the reserves and colts in the best day of 2013 so far.

ROUND 10

SOUTH Fremantle came up 67 points short of the two-time reigning premiers Claremont at Fremantle Oval.

Schloithe picked up 32 possessions while Cook gathered 31, Banner 30, Guglielmana 21 and Tighe 15 and 32 hit outs up against Mark Seaby and Mitch Andrews.

The news was much better in the reserves with South Fremantle running out 16.7 (103) to 9.5 (59) winners over Claremont.

Jarrod Parry was outstanding in his second game back from his second knee reconstruction finishing with 28 possessions, four inside-50 entries and a goal for the Bulldogs in the 44-point victory.

The South colts went down to Claremont by 15 points.



2013 SEASON

ROUND 11

SOUTH Fremantle turned on its best performance so far and saved it for the biggest day of the WAFL season to thump East Fremantle by 67 points in the Foundation Derby at East Fremantle Oval.

The Bulldogs turned on a clinic at times kicking four goals in 13 minutes in the first quarter, six in 17 to start the second term and eight in the first 21 of the third to lead by as much as 83 points before winning by 67, 21.13 (139) to 10.12 (72).

Tighe had dominated the ruck with 22 hit outs before he went off with an ankle injury and Alistair Gillespie had already put together a strong game by that point up forward with three first half goals, but he carried the ruck throughout the second half in the absence of Tighe.

Hams and Cook who dominated the contest and vied for best on ground honours right throughout the afternoon while Martinez led the way with another nine tackles to go with his 23 possessions.

Grima and Mitch Carter both earned a recall into the league side and made the most of it with Justin Monaco playing his second straight Foundation Derby, and keeping returning East Fremantle big man Rob Young quiet. Last year, Monaco kicked five goals against South Fremantle.

Dylan Ross continued his outstanding form as a key defender with 22 possessions and 10 marks. Nick Borovac was also terrific keeping Ryan Lester-Smith goalless and sneaking forward to kick the first goal of his 30-game league career.

The reserves went down by 17 points and the colts won by 37.

ROUND 12

SOUTH Fremantle had its chances to put a good score on the board through the first three quarters against Subiaco at Leederville's Medibank Stadium, but couldn't and then the Lions turned it on with a run of nine straight goals to win by 53 points.

The Bulldogs came into the game coming off their best performance of the season with a thumping 67-point win over East Fremantle in last Sunday's Foundation Derby, but Subiaco was in hot form as well having handed Claremont its first loss of the 2013 season also last Sunday.

Martinez was the hardest worker and most consistent contributor with 20 possessions, nine tackles, six clearances, three inside-50s entries and two rebounds from the defensive 50.

Martinez had another 25 possessions, Grima 23 disposals, Bairstow 21 and youngster Tim Kelly 18.

The reserves had a strong 22-point with Lowrie outstanding with 29 possessions and three goals.

The colts recorded an incredible thumping of Swan Districts ending up winning by 167 points, 25.24 (174) to 1.1 (7). Ben Sokol kicked six goals, Matthew Ah Siu five and Jacob Dragovich had 33 possessions.

ROUND 15

SOUTH Fremantle wasn't quite able to hold on to win and celebrate Craig White's 150th game in style but the 10-point loss to Perth was an improved performance.

Tighe was the best big man on the ground with 26 possessions, seven marks, 35 hit outs, three inside-50 entries and a goal.

Banner continued his strong season with another good game with 29 possessions and two goals with Mugambwa kicking three goals. Hams had 24 touches while Borovac was terrific in defence holding Perth captain Paul Bevan to one goal. Ross also worked hard for 23 possessions and seven marks.

Kelly picked up 24 possessions and kicked a goal with captain Cook gathering 25 disposals and Bairstow 20.

The reserves held on to win 14.14 (98) to 14.10 (94) against the top side with Matera kicking another six goals. The colts went down by 32 points though.

ROUND 16

SOUTH Fremantle fell just four points short of ladder leaders Claremont at Fremantle Oval. Claremont led by 34 points at half-time, but South Fremantle came out from the main break an inspired outfit kicking the only six goals of the third quarter before the Tigers held on to narrowly win.

Banner kicked another three goals to go with 27 possessions with White giving tremendous run and carry to constantly set up play off the half-back line for the Bulldogs finishing with 25 disposals.

Ross also had 22 touches down back with McIntosh racking up 21, Mitch Carter 20 and Adam Carter 19. Schloithe picked up 24 possessions while also laying nine tackles and Cook had 22 touches. Hams and Mugambwa both kicked three goals.

The reserves recorded a 21-point win over Claremont with Winter racking up 33 possessions and Adams 27 disposals.

The colts started the day off perfectly with a 51-point win with Willie Rioli kicking three goals.

Banner has been South Fremantle's leading goal scorer and ball winner and had a season-best five goals to go with 28 possessions.

Miller kicked three goals to go with 25 possessions in his 293rd WAFL game with Saunders also kicking three goals on return.

Hams racked up 35 possessions, Cook 30, Schloithe 28, Kelly 24, Guglielmana 24, Bairstow 23 and Winter returned with 22 and six tackles.

Borovac kept Anthony Tsalikis to one goal while Ross continued his terrific form at centre half-back.

The reserves went down by 34 points but the colts had a massive 85-point win with Jermaine Lewis kicking four goals and Blaine Johnson three.

ROUND 19

THE Bulldogs couldn't continue their recent form with East Fremantle running out 20.18 (138) to 8.7 (55) winners to claim the Uittenbroek-Ciccotosto Cup in the final derby of 2013.

Banner once again did all he could with 31 possessions and kicking two goals. Cook had 24 disposals, McIntosh 24, Schloithe 23, Brendan Verrier 21, Adams, 20, Miller 19, Bairstow 19, Ross 17 and Borovac 17.

The reserves won by 42 points, though, and the colts prevailed by six.

ROUND 20

SOUTH Fremantle finished full of running to down Subiaco by eight points at Medibank Stadium after booting six goals to two in the last quarter.

ROUND 23

FOOTBALL OPERATION MANAGER'S REPORT

I HAVE only been here two years and there has been a lot of change in that time, and Stuart as the CEO has only been here since November, and it's fair to say that the way we run our football department has taken quite a different twist to how it was done previously.

One of the elements we wanted to really bolster was to ensure that all the coaching, football and medical side of things complement everything that we are doing with our strength and conditioning, and rehab and recovery work.

Mike Vegar has been a big bonus here and we have progressed this to have it ready to go for 2014.

With the league team, we played 11 first-gamers in 2013 which was good and they all looked like they belonged out there, albeit a couple of them only played the one game. Timmy Kelly strung together 12 games, Brendan Verrier strung together eight games and then the likes of James Laurino, Marlon Pickett, Kaiden Matera and Kingsley Smith were among the others to show good signs so the future bodes well there



season and it was very different to what they did in 2012 before and I think because it was such a strenuous pre-season, it stood the group in good stead late in games. We lost eight games where we were beaten by 18 points or less so from that point of view, the pre-season worked well.

We thought that some of the younger kids might hit a brick wall three quarters way through the year, but that didn't happen and it was impressive to see them finish the year off strongly.

The concept of a full-time conditioning coordinator has not been done here before, and probably not to this degree at any other WAFL club, so Mike has been a terrific addition to the club.

Our coaching structure worked pretty well led by Hase. We had Patrick Bowden and Michelle Cowan coming in new, and unfortunately Scott Thornton isn't going to be going on with his coaching next year and we thank him for all his efforts as a coach and player. Patty and Michelle brought something different to our footy club, and Hase in his second year of coaching certainly learned some lessons from his first year and I think he will be a better coach again in his third year.

In terms of the reserves, it was a great result winning the premiership so convincingly and more to the point doing it with a young team which Tony Walters nurtured so well. You take out Jarrad Winter, Reece Adams and Shaun Bewick, and the team is basically 18, 19 and 20-year-olds.

The colts had another solid year. They had a little bit of a lapse in the middle of the year when the State 18s boys were away, but they were able to pick it up when they got back. That colts team was a young team too so they should be up around the mark again as well.

The other good thing about it was that we were able to bring some colts players up into the reserves and then Blaine Johnson even came up into the league side and certainly didn't look out of place. Arthur and his coaching group have a real emphasis

for our development of younger players.

The onus now is on us recruiting to fill in the demographic of players between 24 and 27 years of age to bring some experience and leadership to South Fremantle.

We certainly didn't see losing the first eight games coming. They came off a solid pre-

on developing senior players and some of them end up being drafted, which is a bonus for them. That's the direction we are heading in as a footy club.

Daniel Vidovich continues to do an outstanding job in his player development role and he is highly regarded within in the competition, and that's a bonus for us because our development squads continue to come through with plenty of talent year after year. The future of our younger players coming through thanks to Vido's work will continue to improve even further.

In terms of our support staff, Tony Mollica and Peter Matier are both fantastic team managers as is Sue Jones with the colts. Sandy Cuccovia as our property manager is going to leave a big hole to fill and it is becoming incredibly difficult to find volunteers who are that dedicated to the football club.

There are a lot of people who have been at this football club for a long, long time and they are such fine servants, but it presents new challenges when those people decide to pull up stumps and move on to spend more time with their family. It's going to be an increasingly difficult situation to replace some of these people who have been around for so long, and who love the footy club so passionately.

The overall outcome for 2013 is that we are excited for the future because we have now blooded some good young players, and that's going to be our future. We will then selectively recruit what we need on top of that. Ashton Hams is one of the best players in the league so having him back with us full-time is a massive boost.

I'd like to thank all of the club's support staff for their efforts again throughout the year and the club's Board has shown a good understanding of where we are at in terms of a young playing group that is developing, and their support has been fantastic for the coaching staff and footy department.

Personally, I am keen to stick around and help the South Fremantle Football Club climb back up the ladder as well. It was quite an interesting story about how I ended up at the club, but now that I am here I am very keen to stick around.

My wife Carla was going through some health problems and our daughter was living in Perth so I resigned from Rowing Australia, and we spent a month driving across the country and we ended up in Esperance when I saw that the South Fremantle football manager's job was available.

I rang Brian Cook up at Geelong and he gave me Brian Ciccotosto's number. We hit Perth on February 13, 2012 and the club chatted to me the next morning, offered me the job that same day and I started at the club on February 20 and have been here ever since.

Two years into the Hasleby era, I think we have made significant changes and progress in the football department. When you think that there is only Kris Miller, Craig White, Reece Adams and Paul Mugambwa from the 2009 premierships side, the turnover in players has been massive. Because of that we have had to bring up young talent underneath and turn them into 30 and 50 game players as quickly as we can to build our next premierships team.

I am confident that we are all up for the challenge of seeing it through.

SENIOR COACH REPORT

IN THE end when you reflect back on our 2013 season you look at it as a disappointment. You aim to play finals and we didn't achieve that, but it certainly was the tale of two different halves of the season.

The first half of the season was very disappointing and that wasn't helped with losing some key players to injury, but in the second half we showed some confidence in what we were doing, got some key players back and to beat both grand final sides in the last four rounds was very pleasing, and gives us a lot of confidence going into next year.

On the whole it was a disappointing year, but I also believe that we have built the foundation for a successful era at the South Fremantle Football Club.

We had a different training program, we learned a lot about each other as coaches and learned a lot about our players, and we believe that we have come up with a formula that is going to hold us in good stead for next year.

Whilst 2013 wasn't the greatest year on paper, it will go down as a very successful year, in my opinion, as we move forward now.

If you reflect on the last two seasons, we have lost eight games by under three goals and we probably just lacked a little bit of leadership and class to finish off those games with wins, but in saying that you learn from it and we have exposed a lot of young players over the last two years.

We played 42 players in the league team this year, which says that we have been through a bit of a rebuilding phase but it also shows that we have a lot of depth going into next year. We will have 44 players on our list who have played league footy and we need to add to that list going into next year, but I am very confident that 2014 is going to be a good one.

There's no doubt that premiership sides are built on your back six and we've had a lot of youth go through there the last couple of years, and we've also had our key defenders Dylan Ross and Nick Borovac fighting out of their weight division on a lot of occasions.

Justin Monaco is another young player who came in this year, Adam McIntosh took the next step, Jason Maskos showed good signs, Warrick Andreoli played some good games late in the season and we had the marshal back there in Craig White. The back-line is very young and we've put some games into them, and



hopefully they are now at the point with 50 games under their belt where they are ready to become a major part of our success going forward.

Another big key for us going forward is the midfield depth that we have built with all of the young guys we have given chances to.

Schloithe has been very good as has Verrier, Tim Kelly had an outstanding year and we hope to keep him going into 2014, Martinez is an absolute special when you talk about pressure and defensive work. When you add them to class players like Cook, Hams and Banner who we had this year, it has the makings of a very good midfield which is what you need to be successful.

I can't say enough about our captain Ryan Cook. When you are 0-8 like we were, as a coach you need your leaders to step up and he was one of them who really did something about it. For me I will always be grateful for his performance

throughout the year not only from playing well, but the leadership qualities he has now developed over the last two years. Going into his third season as captain, he is going to be an outstanding leader and player.

Going into 2013, I always knew we were a bit underdone in the forward-line. We had a lot of guys coming off operations. In 2012, we had Ben Saunders kick 66 goals, Andrew McCarrey kick 27, Jayden Woods 25 and John Sgherza 23 and we either didn't have those guys for any of the year in 2013 or for very little of it.

When we lost Saunders in the first game that added a bit of insult to injury, but within that you learn a lot about other players like Kingsley Smith and Kaiden Matera who got an opportunity. It certainly is an area we've highlighted that we need to improve in and our recruiting has been based around getting some forwards to help out Saunders, Mugambwa and Gillespie.

In terms of highlights, it's always good to beat the arch enemy East Fremantle in the Foundation Derby. That was a really good game where as a coach everything came together, but it's very frustrating when you can't find that consistency and play that type of football week after week.

Then the wins over the two grand final sides in the last four or five weeks were pleasing, especially the win over East Perth in

our last home game of the season. That was a day where we had to fight hard and we came away with the win, and showed some really exciting signs for the future not only with Marlon Pickett's debut, but with what all of our young players showed that day.

Even though there were some highlights and encouraging signs, really the most important things out of the year is that we continued to build on our plans and playing group that we now hope can be successful going forward.

Over the last two years we have built a lot of depth over the list and got 50 games into a lot of key players throughout all the positions on the ground. We've had a new coaching group and I've been developing my own game plan, and have been getting that across to my own coaches and players. Now we aren't going to change too much going into 2014 and we are feeling very confident going into next year.

To be part of a WAFL coaching group, you have to really love footy. It takes a lot of time away from your family so I'm really pleased with the group we had. I really thank Scott Thornton for his contribution to our footy club the last two years as a coach and before that as a player.

Patrick Bowden in his first year was outstanding marshalling the defence and he is going to be a very good coach one day in his own right, so I learned a lot from him. Michelle Cowan brought a different expertise to the group as well and we will keep adding to our coaching group, but we think we are giving our players the best chance to learn the way we want to play footy.

The addition of Mike Vegar as our strength and conditioning coach was a big signing for our club as well and it has allowed us to do things that we don't believe any other WAFL club is doing in terms of getting our players right physically, and that's only going to continue to bring benefits going forward.

To also have 'Wilbur' Tony Walters win a premiership in the reserves suggests that we are doing some things right, and we do have some good depth. His support across the year was very good and I congratulate him and all his team on their premiership.

The depth at a footy club is everything and with the colts having played in three straight grand finals, and now the reserves winning a premiership we have plenty of it. You look at the premiership teams and they often go very well in both reserves and league, and our last premiership was built off our colts and reserves building up, and then the league side cashing in on the talent coming through.

Halfway through the year, we were just so-so in the reserves, but those kids who came up through the colts system the last couple of years really showed they could play senior football and will now continue to put a lot of pressure on our league group. The best thing about a lot of depth is that it makes everyone accountable for their performance, and if they don't perform they will find themselves out of the team.

Personally, I am absolutely loving the challenge of being a senior coach. I always knew taking over at South Fremantle that it was going to be a challenge, but two years on I just can't wait to get stuck into things in 2014.

I feel like we have done a lot of the hard yards over the last two years, I've learned a lot about myself as a coach and particularly in getting the vision and game plan right. The biggest art of coaching is then communicating that across to the group, which is what I have learned the most about the last two years. It's OK to have all these whizz bang theories on footy, but unless you can get it across to your group it's not worth too much.

Throughout 2013, we really got to coaching what we wanted exactly and the players started to adjust to that, and I think it showed in the back half of the year and hopefully that now continues, and is built upon in 2014.

CAPTAIN COOK CLAIMS SECOND HUGHES MEDAL

THE South Fremantle Football Club awarded captain Ryan Cook with his second WJ Hughes Medal in three years as the club honoured its 2013 season at the Griff John Function Centre at Fremantle Oval.

It marks a superb three years with the Bulldogs for the 25-year-old after spending four years in the AFL with Collingwood where he played 14 matches.

Cook arrived at Fremantle Oval in 2011 and had an immediate impact winning the Hughes Medal that season while also representing Western Australia.

He again played for WA in 2012 and finished just behind Kris Miller in the fairest and best count and now in 2013, he was recognised for his outstanding second season as captain where he averaged almost 26 possessions a game by winning his second fairest and best award in three years at the club.

Cook's strong consistent season for the Bulldogs split between the wing and on the ball was recognised with solid vote gathering right throughout the year from the coaching staff.

He finished with 47 votes to take out the WJ Hughes Medal with an eight-vote advantage over runner-up Sean Tighe. The ruckman finished in second place with 39 votes.

Tighe was outstanding all season long virtually carrying the ruck duties alone finishing up averaging over 19 possessions and 28 hit outs a game.

Tighe's good friend and first year recruit from Port Adelaide in the AFL Mitch Banner was tied on 36 votes for third-place with emerging young defender Nick Borovac.

Banner was South Fremantle's leading possession gatherer throughout the season averaging almost 27 touches while also taking out the Bulldogs leading goalkicker award, the John Gerovich Trophy, after booting 33 majors for the year.

Borovac continued to emerge as one of the best defenders in the entire competition in 2013 with coach Paul Hasleby not afraid to give him the task of playing on the best forwards whether small or tall, and with the 21-year-old consistently coming through for the team.

Borovac also received the Culver Family Award to recognise courage and perseverance.

Borovac's fellow defender Dylan Ross had a breakout season. The 23-year-old had managed just eight games in two years at Claremont as a centre half forward before crossing to South Fremantle in 2011 where



he played just 13 matches coming into 2013, but this year he cemented his spot at centre half-back.

Ross was outstanding in not only playing on opposition key forwards, but also being outstanding at chopping off with marks from opposition kicks inside the 50 and with setting up play out of the defensive 50.

The coaching staff rewarded his season with 34 votes in the Hughes Medal count as he finished in fourth position in the first year of his career where he was given a consistent run in the league line-up.

Paul Mugambwa was fifth on 29 votes followed by young Jacob Martinez on 28, three-time winner Kris Miller on 28, Haiden Schloithe 28, Adam Guglielmana 27, Adam McIntosh 27, Ashton Hams 25, Craig White 22, Adam Carter 20, Mitch Carter 20 and Tim Kelly 20.

Other league awards presented on the night saw Guglielmana receive the Warren Medal as the Best Clubman while 19-year-old midfielder Kelly was named the Best First Year player and received the Shearer Family Award.

Lifetime Members Awards were also presented to Jan Whelan and Alan Branch.

RESERVES COACH REPORT

THE role as reserves coach had changed coming into this year when we went from having three coaches to one and that came about after I put forward to the club that I didn't believe three coaches really worked.

I was appointed the head coach of the reserves side and I didn't specifically have a role in the league box, which I enjoyed and I really wanted to focus my time on the reserves guys.

We were coming off finishing second last in 2012, might as well have finished last, and then with the colts coming off a couple of premierships we knew that we would have some talent coming through so we put some special work into our reserves group by increasing the rewards we can give them and working on some specific things with them to help in their development.

Our season got off to a pretty good start really even though we did lose a couple of games early, but once we were able to get our best side together mid-year we really started to hit our straps.

We lost to West Perth, which was the start of their winning



streak, in Round 18 and we didn't lose a game after that either. That was our last loss and from there on we beat the sides above us on the ladder to then end up finishing second on the ladder going into the finals.

We were in fifth position on percentage with four games to go and I challenged the group to win the last four games and I told them if they did that, that I believed we could win the grand final and that's how it panned out.

We ended up beating Perth, who was the top side, by 93 points in the last round and then we beat them again in the second semi, and then we did well in the grand final and got the better of West Perth and our guys played really well to win the premiership.

On grand final day, we kicked our best score of the year of 19.6 and only four of those points came off the boot so it was great goalkicking and so often that can win you a game of footy.

The program we put in place worked and full credit to the players for embracing what we were trying to do at reserves level, and they understood it's a pathway for them into the league side and not just a bunch of guys left over. To end up with a premiership was a

great reward for them.

One of the important things about our year was that we had the reserves' leading goalkicker in the side with Kaiden Matera and as a whole group, the boys' embraced playing as a team at reserves level which can be a very hard thing to do. They were willing to play their role and if it meant they stayed in the reserves or got a league game, they still embraced whatever I asked of them and that's full credit to the players for playing to the structures that Hase wanted and that I embraced as the reserves coach.

We had a very young side for a lot of the season but in the finals series we had Jarrad Winter, Reece Adams and Alex Grima chipping in as experienced senior players and then you throw in the real talented young guys like Tim Kelly, Marlon Pickett and Blaine Johnson up forward, and they were all fantastic.

Jarrod Parry was another fantastic story this year and when he came back, he just wanted to play his role. The hardest thing

for me on grand final day was the fact that I had about 10 midfielders, and Jarrod was one of them, but he said he didn't care and he just wanted to part of a premiership side and play his role, and that was the beauty of the whole side really.

Our ruckman Myles Bolger loves a challenge and he's quite a smart man, he's very intelligent, and thinks a lot about his game and we put a bit of work into Frank Stockley heading into the grand final knowing he was probably West Perth's best player. He certainly didn't have the same impact that he did in the grand final as the previous two finals and going into the game, we told Bolger we needed him to break even and that's what he did. He really came on a lot this year and could be a key player going forward for the league side.

We had quite a few of the colts premiership players play in our premiership and for Simon Panizza it was his fourth premiership in-a-row after two in the colts, one as a junior and now with the reserves, so there are some great stories.

I want to thank all of my support staff from my main assistant coaches Cliff Collard and Michelle Cowan, to my team manager Peter Matier and my runners Paul Dynon and Brad Collard. I'm really close to the Collard family and it was great to share the premiership with two great South men.

I couldn't have done what I did without all of the support from the volunteers around the club as well as the support of the league coach Paul Hasleby and all of his support staff.

For me personally, it was very special. I played in a reserves premiership side with South back in 1987 and to now do it as a coach as well having been involved in the club since 1987 as a player or runner or an assistant coach, and I have an enormous passion for the club and I have a real grasp of how hard premier-ships are to win.

In terms of our league side now going forward, the core is there to be a successful side and we just have to be patient to let the guys develop and there is no doubt that the work that Hase is putting in now is exactly what we need with this playing group. The majority of the guys from 2013 are staying on and I reckon that if not in 2014, then the year after success for them isn't too far away.



EMERGING LEADERS STAND TALL FOR BULLDOGS



THE 2013 season was always going to be one where leaders of the future at South Fremantle needed to stand up and three of them in particular did so in defence – Nick Borovac, Adam McIntosh and Dylan Ross.

South Fremantle's back-line went from having enormous experience in the 2009 premierships with Chris Bossong, Josh Head, Scott Thornton, Sam Hunt, Kyle Hams and Craig White to being incredibly youthful coming into 2013.

Even though White returned, none of that

experienced brigade remained from South Fremantle's last premiership and that was highlighted even further when Toby McGrath retired at the end of 2012 and Andrew McCarrey also retired midway through the 2013 season.

Borovac and McIntosh had already been entrusted by being added to South Fremantle's leadership group coming into 2013, but both still had plenty to prove on the field and they delivered in spades throughout the year making them now seasoned campaigners heading into 2014.

Ross made centre half-back his own throughout 2013 in by far the best season of his WAFL career.

That means that now heading into 2014, South Fremantle can build its defence around Ross at centre half-back, Borovac being versatile to play as a tall or small, McIntosh to be hard-at-it half-back and then the likes of White, Adam Guglielmana, Mitch Carter, Jason Maskos, Warrick Andreoli and Justin Monaco to work around those centre pieces.

McIntosh was entrusted with a spot in South Fremantle's leadership group and continued to emerge as a future captain of the club.

McIntosh had played just 17 league games with the Bulldogs coming into the season, but was one of a host of emerging players added to the leadership group underneath captain Ryan Cook and vice-captain White and paid back that faith shown in him in spades.

The 23-year-old had a strong season but a day out in South Fremantle's thumping 93-point win over Peel Thunder with 26 possessions and a career-best three goals.

McIntosh both has enjoyed being part of the leadership group

this year and also likes the look of the defensive unit he is part of.

"We are all pretty young but we are all starting to gel and the more games we get to play together and experience, the better we get. If we can all stick around, then we should be a pretty strong force back there for a long time," McIntosh said.

"I have enjoyed being in the leadership group. I'm not much of a big talker off the field, but on the field I don't mind using my voice and I am starting to learn a lot of leadership qualities from guys like Whitey and Cooky."

Ross came through the ranks at Claremont as a key forward but could only break in for eight league games over 2009 and 2010 before making the tough decision to leave the club he grew up with.

That saw him arrive at South Fremantle ahead of the 2011 season and the first two years had its ups and downs as he adjusted to life at his new club, but in 2013 he has found a regular spot at centre half-back.

His ability to read the ball coming into the defensive 50 and chop off opposition kicks has been his strength while he's also been more than handy in setting up play.

Ross didn't take his decision to leave Claremont at the end of the 2010 season coming off playing in the reserves premiership lightly, but now that he is playing the best football of his career he made the right decision.

"It was definitely one of the hardest decisions I made and I do still have a lot of close mates there at Claremont," Ross said.

"Maybe in the first year I didn't make the transition as well as I could have and was still hanging around with my Claremont mates, but I have definitely fully bought in now and am really enjoying the boys


down here. I have a lot of mates here now and my footy is better for it."

SOUTH Fremantle's ability to produce and nurture some of the best young talent in all of Australia continued to be showcased on the national stage in 2013 with four players in the State 15s squad, five in the 16s and six in the 18s.

While league players such as Sean Tighe, Ryan Cook and Mitch Banner could all consider themselves decidedly unlucky to not be picked in the WAFL's representative side that beat Victoria in Northam on May 18, South Fremantle players pulled on the Black Swan jumper with pride at underage levels.

On the back of Mason Shaw (Port Adelaide) and Adam Carter (West Coast) being drafted last year, a host of star South Fremantle players from the colts showed their talents on the big stage at the National 18s Championships in 2013.

Tom Vandeleur, Dylan Main, Jarrod Pickett, Blaine Johnson, Ben Sokol and Cameron McCarthy all did well representing WA after being key players in the South Fremantle's successful colts team.

WA's 18s carnival began with a 62-point win over Tasmania in Launceston on June 2 with Bulldog pair Johnson and McCarthy booting two goals apiece with Sokol adding another.



The next game was an 82-point victory against the Northern Territory at Lathlain's Brownes Stadium on June 8 with Johnson booting three goals, and McCarthy and Sokol two each while Pickett added one and Main was one of WA's best players on the day.

It was then onto Subiaco's Patersons Stadium to take on Victoria Metro on June 15 where WA lost for the first time by 19 points. However, Johnson was outstanding again up forward kicking four goals with McCarthy also a standout performer with three.



It was then onto Geelong's Simonds Stadium where McCarthy proved to be the hero for WA kicking the winning goal in the three-point win over Victoria Country on June 28.

McCarthy took a soaring mark in between a nest of Vic Country defenders with only 30 seconds left on the clock before kicking the match-winning goal.

WA's final game of the carnival then came on July 3 when carnival champions South Australia prevailed by 10 points in a game where unfortunately McCarthy suffered a lower leg injury.

McCarthy was still named in the All-Australian team from the carnival and the AFL's national talent manager Kevin Sheehan couldn't have been more impressed with the 195cm key forward over the course of the carnival.

"A key marking target up forward was Cameron McCarthy from Western Australia. He was a boy who ended with an injury but gee he made his mark throughout the championship," Sheehan said.

"He took some great marks and none were better than that one in the dying seconds of the game against the Victorians down at Simonds Stadium. He kicked that goal after the siren to win the game."

South Fremantle's young talent coming through continues to be put onto the national stage as well with Kade Stewart, Joel McComb, Callum Ah Chee, Jesse Mirco and Brad Kersten named in the WA State 16s squad taking part in the Championships at Blacktown International Sportspark in Sydney.

Mitchell Dzelebdzic, Andrew Coutinho, Dylan Brown and Daniel Burke were part of the State 15s squad.

PREMIERSHIP STAR EARNS LIFE MEMBERSHIP

CRAIG White has been all about the team his whole career and he's been part of a lot of success in his time with South Fremantle, but in Round 15 in 2013 the focus fell onto him as he played his 150th game with the Bulldogs to earn life membership.

White came up to play with the Bulldogs from Williams and the country boy had an incredible three-year run playing in the 2003 colts premiership, 2004 reserves premiership and then the league triumph of 2005.

Those early days White was a small forward and he kicked 59 goals in his first 56 league games but then coach John Dimmer thought he could use his abilities at the other end to set up play coming out of defence and that's where he has stayed ever since.

White was again a key player in the team that won the 2009 premiership even if his grand final day itself was over early with a shoulder injury.

That made him a two-time league premiership player to go with his colts and reserves flags in just seven years with South Fremantle.

After a year off in 2012 where he headed to Sydney where he was outstanding as a player and coach with the Balmain Dockers while



working at PowerPlay Sports, White returned to South Fremantle and reached his 150th league game at Fremantle Oval against Perth.

The 28-year-old was tremendously proud to reach the mark.

"It is a bit flattering actually reaching this milestone. A little bit of fuss gets made about you and it has been something I've been trying to work towards over the last five or six years," White said.

"Once you get to 50 or 60 games you have the goal to get to 100 to get your name on the locker, and then once you get to 100 you have the goal to get life membership at 150."

White perhaps never realised just how high the standard of football in the WAFL was until he went away and experienced a level below last year. That's partly why he feels he had a slow start to 2013, but he feels he worked his way into some better form the longer the year went on.

Reflecting back on his career to date, White was quick to pay credit to his colts coach Roger Kerr, reserves coach Glen Davies and his only South Fremantle league coach Dimmer until this year for the success he's been able to be part of in his career.

As well as the obvious highlights of the premierships he's played in, a few underdog wins stick out for White as well.

"Looking back on my career at this point, it has been very good and I have been lucky enough to have a lot of very good coaches over the time with Roger Kerr, Glen Davies and John Dimmer. That period of 2003, 2004 and 2005 was very special," he said.

"I've been really lucky in my career to play in premierships and they are amazing, but all finals footy is something you cherish. We played finals in every year except one under John so that's always special and so are the Foundation Derbies.

"This year's win would actually rate right up there with the top few wins I've had and over my career those hard fought wins stick out when we've been underdogs. There was a game against East Perth on a wet, rainy night and there's been times when we have been down and out and I will always remember those fondly."

White wasn't the only South Fremantle player in 2013 to bring up a milestone either.

Captain Ryan Cook brought up his 50th game with the Bulldogs in Round 10 against the reigning premier Claremont at Fremantle Oval.

Despite the loss to the Tigers, Cook still worked hard to pick up 31 possessions and lead South Fremantle from the front as he did all season long, and as he since in his last two seasons as skipper and his three years in total with the Bulldogs.

Cook arrived at South Fremantle at the start of the 2011 season after spending the previous four years in the AFL with Collingwood where he played 14 matches, including nine in 2008.

However, since arriving at South Fremantle the now 25-year-old has won two fairest and best awards and cemented himself as one of the hardest working, and best ball winning players in the WAFL.

The other milestone player in 2013 was 2009 premiership player Reece Adams, who brought up his 50th match with the Bulldogs in Round 3 against Perth at Browne's Stadium.

Adams returned to South Fremantle in 2013 after taking a year off in 2012, and played 12 league matches for the season while also taking part in the reserves premiership.



YOUNGSTERS IMPRESS

THE great positive to come out of the 2013 season for South Fremantle was the exciting football played by some of the young players as they get set for terrific WAFL, or even AFL, careers.

By the end of the season, Jacob Martinez, Tim Kelly, James Laurino and Brendan Verrier had played outstanding football through the middle, Marlon Pickett and Blaine Johnson finished the season tremendously and a host of others received opportunities throughout the season.

Tom Vandeleur, Sean Lynch, Warrick Andreoli, Jason Maskos and Kingsley Smith all made their WAFL debuts in Round 1 against Claremont and as the season rolled on Kelly, Kaiden Matera, Zac Strom, Laurino, Johnson and Pickett all made their debuts as well.

While captain Ryan Cook, recruit Mitch Banner, veteran Kris Miller, Toby Bairstow and Ashton Hams were still important contributors through the midfield for the Bulldogs at the feet of outstanding ruckman Sean Tighe, the on-ball brigade showed a glimpse into the future as the season rolled on.

Martinez had already played nine matches coming into the 2013 season after finishing 2012 showing his potential, and he carried that on superbly to cement himself as one of the best young midfielders in the competition.

The 21-year-old improved his ball-winning ability as the season went on and averaged 17.8 possessions a game including a high of 26 against Subiaco in Round 20, but even more impressive was his establishment as one of the very best tacklers in the whole of the competition.

He was soon joined by fellow young Indigenous midfielder Kelly who made his debut in Round 10 and never looked back.

While still eligible to play colts, the 19-year-old Kelly quickly adjusted to league football and played the last 12 games of the season before finishing off in the reserves premiership.

He averaged over 19 possessions a game in the league side including 24 disposals on three occasions in Rounds 15, 18 and 22. He showed his ability to be clean below his knees, quick with his hands and his speed and ability to run and carry the ball became a treat to watch for Bulldogs fans.

Verrier had already made his debut with two appearances in 2011 and it took the 19-year-old midfielder until Round 15 to earn his first league game in 2013, but once he got in the team he never looked back.

He showed just how good of a ball winner and hard working midfielder he could be in the final eight games of the season, including a day out with 32 possessions in Round 22 against Peel,



and he will be another player who South Fremantle's midfield can be built around for years to come.

Laurino had come through the successful colts premiership teams as well and played some good football in the reserves to earn his league debut by Round 20 and the 20-year-old showed terrific signs over the final four matches of the season before then playing in the reserves premiership.

Laurino showed that he could win his own ball with 22 possessions and an outstanding goal in the win over Peel in Mandurah in Round 22, but even more impressive were the roles he played for the team in the wins over Subiaco in Round 20 and East Perth in Round 23.

On debut, South Fremantle coach Paul Hasleby threw the challenge to

Laurino of running with Subiaco's state wingman and former Hawthorn player Jarrod Kayler-Thomson, and he did an outstanding job limiting his influence on the contest.

Then against East Perth, West Coast's Cale Morton loomed as one Royals player the Bulldogs needed to keep quiet and Laurino again did the job superbly making sure he had no influence on the game as well.

"There has been a deliberate ploy to give these guys an opportunity to show what they can do and you don't find out about a player in two or three games, you find out over 20 and 30," South Fremantle coach Paul Hasleby said.

"Tim Kelly is a star in the midfield, Martinez has been doing it for two years now and they are going to be really valuable players for us going forward. To have that next tier coming up now like Laurino, Verrier and guys like that the club is in a good position.

"We just have to maintain the playing list and continue to develop some of those guys and add other blokes around them."

With South Fremantle's league side finishing off the 2013 season in impressive fashion, Pickett and Johnson also played the last two games and showed tremendous signs.

Johnson's debut might not have been as impressive as Pickett's, but over the last two matches both players showed that they will be strong WAFL footballers in the future for South Fremantle if indeed they don't end up in the WAFL.

Both then went into the finals with the South Fremantle reserves team and helped them to a premiership with Johnson named best on ground in the grand final.

The pair played their first league game in the Round 23 in the eventual win over East Perth and Pickett's performance will go down in history as one of the all-time best performances from a first-gamer.

FOR BULLDOGS IN 2013

The 21-year-old had played the last seven matches in the reserves at South Fremantle to earn his league debut and what an immediate impact he made.

Pickett's sheer numbers were incredible with him finishing with 26 possessions, nine marks, four clearances, eight inside-50 entries and three goals.

However, there was more to his performance than just the numbers. Pickett showed he has tremendous pace and evasive ability but he also can play tall and mark strongly above his head meaning that he can virtually play any position on the ground.

With good size, all the physical attributes most can only dream of and clearly a temperament that allows him to stand tall on the big occasion, Pickett has a bright future even though his WAFL league career is just two games old.

Kris Miller has now played 298 WAFL matches since making his debut in 1999 so he has seen players of all shapes, sizes and abilities come in and make their debuts with differing levels of success over the last 14 years.

The 32-year-old, who kicked five goals himself in the win, can't recall ever seeing a better debut than the one Pickett made and he would be encouraging any AFL club to pick him up and put him on their list later this year in the National Draft.

"I would pretty strongly be suggesting that he could be one of the rare blokes who could get drafted on the back of just one game. People might have been looking at him before anyway, but those physical attributes he has don't just drop out of trees," Miller said.

"He has done the work, he is a really good guy, he has never missed a training session and he is a quiet fella but I can't see any reason why an AFL club wouldn't give him a chance. He is still a very raw talent who with a little bit of polish, could be very good at the next level."

Paul Mugambwa is an excitement machine himself and the 32-year-old 128-game veteran found himself in awe of what Pickett was doing out on Fremantle Oval as the game unfolded.

"I was one of the ones clapping out there half the time seeing what he was doing. Usually guys are nervous when they make their debut and it takes a while for them to get used to the pace, but I just told him to back himself and he took it in his stride," Mugambwa said.



"He was shimming guys, taking guys on, kicking goals, taking marks and he gave us a lot of the speed and drive that we've been looking for consistently over the course of the year.

"It's just exciting to see him out there and his family come here to watch him. He's got a great story and I'm really proud to see him out there and take his opportunity."

"I might not get drafted at 34, but at the same time a lot of clubs are realising that they might have missed guys when they were 16, 17 or 18 but now they are doing really well and are worth looking at if they are in their 20s.

"It was only one game for Marlon and he might have harder games when he gets more attention from the opposition, but he has the potential to play AFL definitely."

Johnson might not have had the same impact in his first game for South Fremantle against East Perth, but in the final round against Perth he showed what he can do at league level with three goals.

With the likes of Martinez, Kelly, Verrier, Laurino, Pickett, Johnson and a host of other youngsters, South Fremantle's future is in good hands and 2013 could well have been just the stepping stone for the league getting back into the finals mix.

Michelle was also appointed as mentor coach for the AFL High Performance Academy for youth girls based in Melbourne which toured New Zealand in October.

She currently serves as an assistant coach at the South Fremantle Football Club to league coach Paul Hasleby.

The Football Woman of the Year Award recognises women in the industry who have made a significant contribution to the game of Australian Football.

Presented by the Essendon Women's Network, this prestigious award is judged by an independent panel and is open to any woman involved in football regardless of club or profession.

Cowan was nominated by the WAFC for her achievements and the contribution she has made to football in Western Australia.

"Michelle is a great example of what can be achieved if you have a dream and follow it with passion," Moore said.

SOUTH FREMANTLE HALL OF FAME

THE South Fremantle Football Club has an incredible history since being formed in 1900 and many of the great champions on and off the field from the club were inaugural inductees into the Hall of Fame in 2011.

The South Fremantle Football Club had its first induction ceremony to the Hall of Fame in 2011 with 45 of the club's most outstanding players and officials admitted who made a significant impact at the club between 1900 and 1979.

The evening back in 2011 commenced with the induction of Griff John, founder of the club in 1900, and concluded with the induction of Brownlow Medallist, Brad Hardie, who commenced his playing career with the Bulldogs in 1979.

And in between those two, there are some of the all-time great players of West Australian football not to mention some legendary figures off the field.

The first player inducted was South Fremantle's first 100-game player Harry Hodge and then went onto the stars of the golden era of the late 1940s and early 1950s Frank 'Scranno' Jenkins, Jack 'Corp' Reilly, Clive Lewington, Dave Ingraham, Bernie Naylor, Frank Treasure, Eric Eriksson, North Smith, Steve Marsh, Harry Carbon, Len Crabbe, Charlie Tyson, Laurie Green, Des Kelly, John Colgan, Cliff Hillier, Ray Richards, Tony Parentich and Barry White.

The inducted players then went through John Todd, John Gerovich and to modern all-time legends of Australian football Stephen Michael and Maurice Rioli.

It wasn't just players honoured, though, with long-term president Bill Hughes, legendary trainer Tom Bottrell Snr and long-term doctor Dr Dick Reid among those inducted.

Players and officials from 1980 onwards plus the second intake from between 1900 and 1979 will be inducted at the second instalment of the South Fremantle Football Club Hall of Fame, expected to take place in 2016.

RAY 'THE LIZARD' ENTERS HALL OF FAME



SOUTH Fremantle champion full-back Ray Richards' career was honoured in 2013 when inducted into the WA Football Hall of Fame.

Richards wasn't the only South Fremantle player inducted either with 2009 premiership player Peter Bell also honoured on the night.

Richards will go down as the club's greatest ever full-back with his toughness and courage, combined with his brilliant marking and kicking

skills making him a standout performer in the golden era.

After making his debut in 1951, the man affectionately known as 'Lizard' played 148 games with the Bulldogs and was a key contributor in the premierships of 1952 and 1954 and was captain in 1958.

Richards was made a life member of the South Fremantle Football Club in 1965 and inducted into the club's Hall of Fame in 2011, and now deservedly will enter the WA Football Hall of Fame.

On top of his performances for South Fremantle, he went on to captain-coach Claremont in 1959 and 1960 to take his WAFL games total to 195 while representing Western Australia on 13 occasions.

Looking back, Richards finds it hard to separate the winning premierships and state matches against Victoria as his highlights.

"Undoubtedly the premierships of 1952 and 1954 stand out, but I also loved playing for Western Australia particularly against the Vics on a damp day," Richards said.

"They had the reputation of being the tough guys of footy. In fact, I thought many were wimps."

Richards arrived at South Fremantle from Deanmill, the same south west town as Sir Ross Hutchinson and John Todd, after being born in Pemberton.

At just 18, he won his club's fairest and best award as a centre half-forward before being encouraged to come to South Fremantle at the end of 1949 by Hutchinson.

After spending 1950 in the reserves, he received his chance the following season after the retirement of Bob Mason and immediately made the full-back position his own.

Aged just 21, he became a premiership player in 1952 when South Fremantle beat West Perth in the grand final but his 1953 season was hindered by a broken ankle.

However, he was back strongly in 1954 and starred in the premiership and became a regular member of WA's team as its full-back. He played 13 games for WA in total, several as vice-captain, between 1955 and 1959.

Whether it was playing for South Fremantle, WA or Claremont, Richards was virtually unbeatable as a full-back because of his tremendous closing speed and ability to spoil his opponents from almost any position.

On top of that, he had a tremendous leap and his high-marking was a great highlight of his game as was his kicking skills.

Richards was named captain of South Fremantle in 1958, but at the end of the season received an offer he couldn't refuse to leave for Claremont and become captain-coach.

After two years and 34 games with the Tigers, Richards headed to Geraldton in 1962 to become playing-coach of Towns where he won the club's fairest and best in 1963 and was runner-up for the Clune Medal in 1963.

He retired soon after, but his contributions to football and interest in it have never died off. He served on the South Fremantle committee, is still a SFFC Past Players Association committee member and attends home games at Fremantle Oval along with his daughter Susan, and granddaughters Kristy and Emmie.

BULLDOGS' INDIGENOUS HERITAGE

THE South Fremantle Football Club have long supported and celebrated the rich history of Indigenous Footballers within the Bulldogs community.

With the support of The Strzelecki Group and DTMT Construction the South Fremantle Football Club are able to support their local Indigenous Footballers in assisting their transition into the higher ranks of football with guidance and financial support in travel, accommodation and education.

South Fremantle could very well have the richest Indigenous heritage of any football club in the country.

South Fremantle's heritage of Indigenous players includes the club having named its own Indigenous Team of the Century in 2009, having four Bulldogs players named in the AFL's Indigenous Team of the Century and had almost 100 players of Aboriginal backgrounds representing the club.

Back in 2005, four South Fremantle products were given the biggest accolades possible with Stephen Michael, Maurice Rioli, Nicky Winmar and Peter Matera all named in the AFL's Indigenous Team of the Century which recognised the great Indigenous players from 1904 to 2004 from across Australia.

The South Fremantle Football Club then followed suit in 2009 and named its own Team of the Century that reads like a who's who of the great Indigenous footballers that the game has seen.

It was far from an easy task to pick the best 22 either from the 78 players at the time that had represented South Fremantle dating back to Jimmy Melbourne who was the first Aboriginal to play senior football in Australia.

As in any such team there are hard luck stories to miss out and selectors Mal Brown, Brian Ciccotosto and Ray Wilson rated life member and premiership player Keren Ugle, Ashley Sampi, Cory McGrath, Warren Campbell, Willie Rioli, Michael Cockie and Shane Tipuamantamerri as the unluckiest casualties.

The quality of those products is highlighted by the fact that some of the team, named at a gala dinner prior to the traditional NAIDOC Week clash against Claremont, are all-time greats of the game.

Stephen Michael, the entire centre-line of Peter Matera, Maurice Rioli and Nicky Winmar, and forwards Jeff Farmer and Phil Matera, are just some of the

names acknowledged as champions nation-wide.

Current or recently-retired AFL players Ashley McGrath (Brisbane Lions), Shannon Cox (Collingwood), Roger Hayden (Fremantle) and Mark Williams (Hawthorn) all earned a spot.

While Nicky Winmar (St Kilda and Western Bulldogs), and Peter and Phil Matera (West Coast) didn't

spend a lot of time in the red-and-white jumper, they all acknowledge the role South Fremantle played in their development up to the AFL ranks.

Former great Bill Hayward was named on the interchange and his career dates back to the 1936 and 37 seasons.

Toby McGrath and Jeff Farmer were both current players named in the team at the time.

It was a real family affair as well with the Matera's (Peter, Phil and Wally), McGrath's (Toby and Ashley), Michael's (Stephen and Clem), Rioli's (Maurice, Sebastian and Dean) and Collard's (Brad and Cliff) all selected.

Stephen and Clem Michael form the father-son combination in the ruck with the legendary Stephen also named captain, with Maurice Rioli his deputy and Mal Brown coach, after being at the helm during the careers of nine of the 22

players selected.


The current South Fremantle team is certainly continuing on that rich Indigenous heritage as well.



TREASURER'S REPORT

THE financial outcome for the year end has resulted in a net loss of \$299,290 inclusive of depreciation and amortization charges of \$100,326.

Whilst our marketing and fund raising efforts have slightly improved in total from 2012, this in itself has not been enough to offset and overcome other areas which have decreased to cause concern.

Membership revenue has decreased and fell by \$41,525 however I do expect this to increase again in the 2014 year because of a new focus on a variety of packages becoming available shortly and a greater push to get old members to rejoin and finding new members.

Football revenue fell due to decrease in gate receipts and also transfer monies received being the main culprits. The gate revenue amounted to a \$23,623 fall and the transfer fees by \$115,500. Gate and attendance have a flow on effect into areas such as bar revenue and the TAB receipts. The lack of winning games effects gate however the development of players into AFL draftees (successful ones) is an area that does not necessarily have that same type of translation.

In total our Income fell from \$2,078,000 in 2012 to \$1,945,000 being \$133,000 decrease. By comparison the total cost of running the club was \$2,242,000 in 2012 to \$2,244,000 in 2013.

It has become more expensive over the last few years to run the club with the undertaking of trying to achieve a high performance operation both on field and administratively, this will take time as young players need to develop as well as having the correct people to achieve these goals , success is not always immediate. The cost of high performance management on and off field has incurred additional expenditure in both leadership expenses \$11,000 and consultancy and wage cost of approximately \$152,000.

During the year we have had a number of cost that have been either unpredictable or first off and by way of example sewerage pumps repairs \$20,000 , fringe benefits tax \$13,000 (increase), payroll tax \$17,000, increase in bad debts \$10,000 , recruitment cost \$16,000, duplicate wages and on cost \$20,000.

With the net loss that was incurred and payout of long service leave provisions the cash reserves have been somewhat reduced. However new projects that will come to fruition in 2014 as well increased remuneration as a result of the AFL alignment (\$120,000 cash) and significant cost reductions I am confident of better results in 2014.

Once again thank you to the loyal members of this club for all your endeavours.
