CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

TOM BOTTRELL

The 2018 season brought a lot of enjoyment on-field, only to see us fall on preliminary final day. There are varying circumstances each season, however everyone involved in our Football Department, Board and Administration were disappointed to lose to West Perth and not reach the first Grand Final at Optus Stadium.

Having convincingly accounted for West Perth in the qualifying final and a spirited performance against Subiaco in the second semi-final, the loss was hard to accept as we felt we were at least in the top two teams and wasted an opportunity to play off for the premiership.

Highlights include the performance of our WJ Hughes Medal winner Marlion Pickett who put himself in contention to enter the AFL. Marlion's growth is another strong endorsement of the work Todd Curley and the coaches do in having mature aged players primed to succeed at AFL level if given the opportunity. On that theme, congratulations to Tim Kelly on a superb first season at Geelong, where he finished in a tie for runner-up in best and fairest count with Patrick Dangerfield. Only Nathan Buckley having polled more Brownlow votes in their first AFL season is testimony to the season Tim put together.

Off-field we saw an improved financial position compared to last year though it was still difficult with fundraising. Specifics are highlighted in the finance report, however the key areas that were down on budget were sponsorship, the club auction and the club raffle. These three items alone combined were short of budget by around \$40,000.

In order to re-engage them, we have sent 2019 membership renewals to all lapsed members as far back as 2014. Once we have a database that we are confident is accurate, the



REDEVELOPMENT AND CITY OF FREMANTLE NEGOTIATIONS

Last year I reported that we were close to signing off the new agreement to remain at Fremantle Community Bank Oval. As we sit here now, we are still working through some details of the agreement which relate to the sub-lease with the Fremantle Football Club. Those obligations and the responsibility for any redevelopment were taken on by the City of Fremantle upon the Dockers exit in August 2017. Whilst those negotiations have been going on, the partnership is working very well in the background. Since moving to Fremantle Community Bank Oval approximately 12 months ago, the city's grounds and facilities team has been fantastic in their support of our needs from a football perspective.

We also have a good network of support sponsors and we sincerely thank you all for partnering us. Best wishes to Bruce in your pending retirement and thank you and Total Eden for backing the Bulldogs.

Wherever possible, we ask members and sponsors to utilise the businesses within the South Fremantle family. Our new Corporate Partnerships Manager - Russell Fletcher - will be compiling the Business Directory which we see as a great way to utilise the services of fellow SFFC partners.

intention is to email renewals rather than post from 2019 onwards. The costs associated with printing and posting 12,000 sheets to 3000 current and lapsed members is inefficient, so we will need your help in this changeover. There will obviously be some members that do not have email addresses and we can continue to post those but, overall, if you don't use Facebook, look at our website or receive our e-Newsletter, call the club and we can update your details with the most appropriate correspondence method.

Life Member nominations, as approved by the Board, will be endorsed at this year's AGM and if successful as expected, we welcome Ryan Cook, Peter Johnson, Hassa Mann and Peter Taylor-Thorpe. Ryan becomes an automatic selection having played 150 senior games, Peter has given wonderful support over 20 years from both a financial perspective and providing employment to 40 of our players; Hassa is our 1970 premiership coach and long-time co-patron and Peter has volunteered many hours in any role he's been called upon to do for in excess of 25 years. Congratulations to all these worthy recipients.



FEMALE FOOTBALL

I'd firstly like to congratulate the fairest and best winners for 2018: League - Lauren Vecchio; Reserves - Pearl Kellie; Youth Girls - Mim Strom. The Youth Girls unfortunately lost the preliminary final however we are fortunate to have one of the most passionate and caring coaches in Adrian Ivancich and a host of talented young players. To league coach Jenna Allomes and reserves Miles Kemp, thank you for your efforts in what proved to be a very difficult season on-field.

We have undertaken a 'One Club' strategy which now sees Female Football sit under SFFC Football Department management. This is in-line with the WAFC and AFL's strategy to enhance the quality of Female Football by utilising State League clubs' resources.

In 2019 we will see a new era with the WAFL-W launched and made up of six teams. We still do not know if we will be one of the six teams but, regardless, we will be playing football in either the WAFL-W or the revamped WAWFL which will effectively be the second division. Given that on-field performances have been poor in both our league and reserves teams, we need to nurture our young talent and bring in some quality players to be competitive.

A Board Sub-Committee made of South Fremantle Director Bruce Willis (Chair), Paul Mugambwa (GM Stephen Michael Foundation), Tom Bottrell (CEO), Greg Dowbnia (SFWFC President) and three appointments from the current SFWFC committee, will effectively replace the current SFWFC committee.

The intention is for the SFWFC Constitution to be dissolved at the November 30 AGM and SFFC will ensure the history and heritage of the female club will be preserved from that date onwards, if that is how the SFWFC members choose to vote.

STAFF AND OPERATIONS

I am fortunate to be able to go to work daily with a team that operates so efficiently and collaboratively. Jess Nolan continues to develop into a leader amongst the administration staff and Brooke Lombardo, after just 18 months here, is ready to take on new responsibilities and roles.

Drew Mazalevskis left us in September and we thank Drew for his time here and the contribution he made to the South Fremantle Football Club. Russell Fletcher replaced Drew as Corporate Partnerships Manager having been a life-long supporter and long-time sponsor. Based on the start that Russell has had, I'm confident we will close the gap on the sponsorship budget deficit for 2019 and beyond.

Thanks once again to our Football Operations Manager - Dave Depane - who does a great job in managing the demands of the football schedule. Dave is very well planned and organised and this is vital in such a role. Whilst now employed by the WAFC, I still want to thank Talent Manager - Jason Pedulla - for the work he does with our talent program and in the district.

Steve McCarthy has been a fixture here since the mid-1990s and nothing is too much trouble for him. Assisted by Lorne McGuinness, Steve performs those behind-the-scenes tasks that most people would overlook, and he ensures our facilities are in good order. Thanks to both of you gentlemen.

Lastly, thank you to all our volunteers and staff for your efforts in 2018.

PAST PLAYERS AND OFFICIALS

To President, Ray Van Burgel, thank you to you and your committee for all you do for our great club. I look forward to being involved in planning for 2019 and to build this important club coterie group with each of you. We need to make a priority of keeping in contact with every past player and official that walks through our gates regardless of whether they played one reserves game or volunteered for 10 years.

WAFC/COMPETITION

Major change is once again upon us in the form of a 10th WAFL team. West Coast Eagles and East Perth have dissolved their partnership and West Coast will now become a WAFL team in their own right. I'm sure we would all love to go back to having the Eagles players allocated across their teams of origin, however, it will never return to that model and we have to keep looking forward to ensure the WAFL survives.

The money injected into the WAFL via the two AFL teams is such that, at least financially, the WAFL could not vote against such a move. The consolation is that West Coast have been exceptional to deal with in this process and genuinely care about WAFL football.

One of the expected outcomes is that we should see a more consistent home-away flow with the fixturing given that we now have an even number of teams. However, the impact of this is that South and East Fremantle, along with East and West Perth, will now only play two derbies per season.

To Haydn Raitt, who completes a wonderful contribution to our club over 21 years, thank you on behalf of all past and present players, supporters and members for the heart you have given to the cause. Haydn will remain a Board Member of the Stephen Michael Foundation and this is a role he enjoys so he is certainly not lost to us.

To all Board Members, you have been a great group to work with this year and we thank you for the many hours you put in. We have a big job to ensure the redevelopment of Fremantle Community Bank Oval sets up our future and I'm confident we have the current Board members to do it.

FOUR BULLDOGS IN TEAM OF THE YEAR

Nick Suban, Haiden Schloithe, Marlion Pickett and Shane Hockey have all been named to the 2018 WAFL Team of the Year.

Over the course of the 2018 WAFL season, the waf1.com.au team selected a Team of the Round after each weekend of football.

The TABtouch Team of the Year has been selected based on those 21 Teams of the Round named throughout the season.

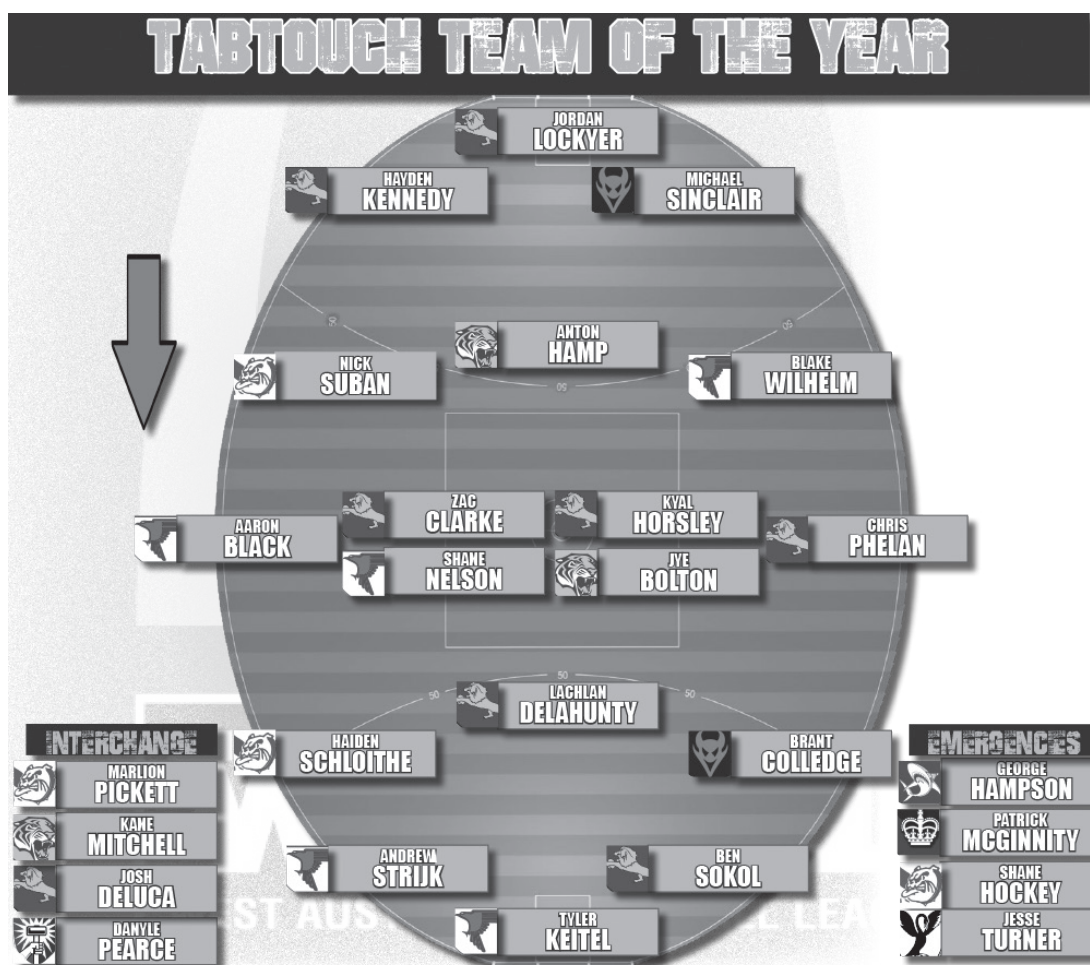
Every player that was named to the Team of the Round on six or more occasions has been included in the Team of the Year, with Subiaco's Lachlan Delahunty and West Perth's Shane Nelson named in 13 of their 18 games.

Subiaco captain Kyal Horsley and West Perth veteran Andrew Strijk were both named 12 times with Perth's Michael Sinclair, Subiaco's Hayden Kennedy and Josh Deluca, and Aaron Black named nine times.

Subiaco's Chris Phelan, Peel Thunder's Danyle Pearce and Claremont's Jye Bolton were selected on eight occasions, and Claremont's Anton Hamp and Kane Mitchell, Perth's Brant Colledge, South Fremantle's Shane Hockey and Nick Suban, and Subiaco's Zac Clarke picked seven times.

South Fremantle's Haiden Schloithe and Marlion Pickett, Subiaco's Ben Sokol, West Perth's Blake Wilhelm and East Fremantle's George Hampson were named six times and made it into the final 26.

Of the 10 players who were nominated five times, West Perth's Tyler Keitel, Subiaco's Jordan Lockyer



and East Perth's Patrick McGinnity made the final 26 along with Swan Districts' Jesse Turner.

A total of 161 players were named at least once to the Team of the Round.

East Perth had the most with 23 of them earning a spot at least once while Subiaco had 22, Swan Districts 19, Peel Thunder 18, South Fremantle 18, Claremont 18, Perth 16, West Perth 15 and East Fremantle 12.

The Lions took 99 of the 462 positions available across the 21 rounds.

West Perth players claimed 65, South Fremantle 62, Claremont 53, East Perth 47, Perth 41, Swan Districts 31, Peel Thunder 34, East Fremantle 26.

The back-line features Subiaco's Lockyer and Claremont's Hamp as the key position players with Subiaco's Kennedy, Perth's Sinclair,

South Fremantle's Suban and West Perth's Wilhelm around them.

Subiaco's Aaron Heal, East Fremantle's Jayden Schofield, Claremont's Haydn Busher and South Fremantle's Shaun Bewick all made strong cases throughout 2018 too.

The midfield was the one most difficult to narrow it down but Subiaco's Horsley, West Perth's Nelson and Claremont's Bolton picked themselves as did Subiaco's Phelan and West Perth's Black as the wingmen.

South Fremantle's Pickett, Claremont's Mitchell, Subiaco's Deluca and Peel's Pearce made up spots on the bench with East Fremantle's Hampson, East Perth's McGinnity, South Fremantle's Hockey and Swan Districts' Turner the emergencies.

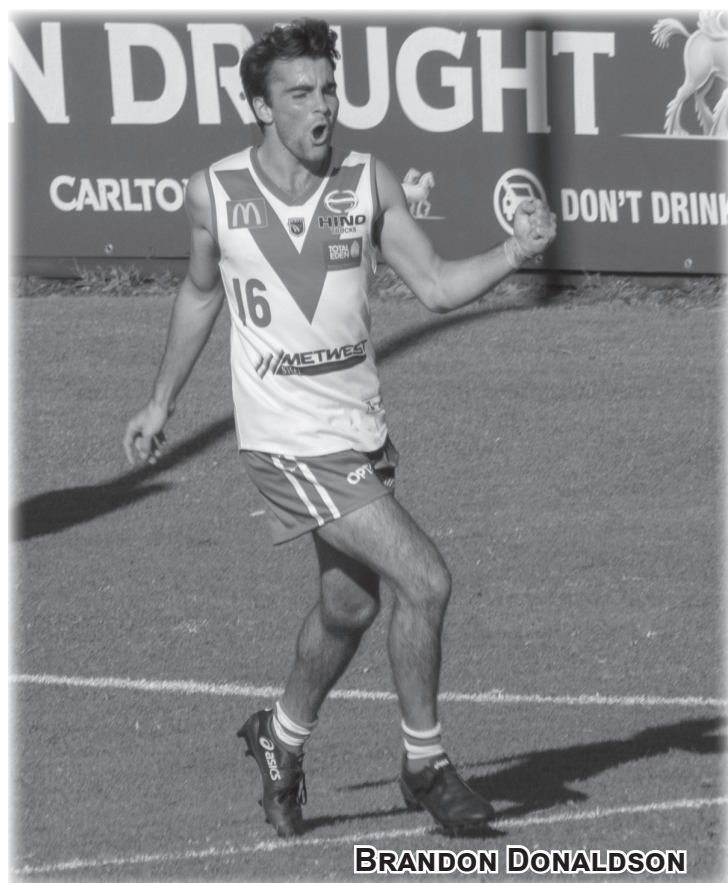

MARLION PICKETT



AUSTRALIAN FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

BERNIE NAYLOR INDUCTED

While the Victorian media might proclaim him the John Coleman of Western Australia, Bernie Naylor's goalkicking exploits came first and the South Fremantle legend took his rightful place in the Australian Football Hall of Fame in 2018.

The goalkicking feats of Naylor are legendary and he ended up kicking 1034 goals for South Fremantle in 194 matches between 1941 and 1954, with a four-year gap because of World War II.

While kicking a record 23 goals in a game along the way, he was six-time league leading goalkicker, nine-time South Fremantle leading goalkicker and a fairest and best winner in 1953.

Naylor also played 16 matches for Western Australia where he kicked 44 goals, but his career wasn't just about his individual exploits.

He was part of a remarkably successful era at South Fremantle as well playing in premierships in 1947, 1948, 1950, 1952, 1953 and 1954 with his last game being the 1954 Grand Final triumph over East Perth.

So kicking 1034 goals, playing for WA 16 times, leading the league's goalkicking six times and your club's nine times, playing in six premierships and winning a fairest and best already made Naylor a legendary figure at South Fremantle and in West Australian football.

It was always a matter of time for him to be inducted into the Australian Football Hall of Fame and now that has happened in 2018.

Naylor's recognition and celebration of his career hasn't stopped this century with him inducted into the West Australian Football Hall of Fame in 2004 and then in the inaugural class in the South Fremantle Football Club Hall of Fame in 2011.



He was then elevated to legend status in the South Fremantle Football Club Hall of Fame in 2016 and now has taken his place in the Australian Football Hall of Fame.

Naylor was inducted in Melbourne alongside Mel Whinnen, Wayne Johnston, Terry Wallace, David Neitz and Matthew Scarlett with Kevin Sheedy elevated to the status of legend.

The South Fremantle legend,

who vies with George Doig and Austin Robertson Jr for the title of WA's greatest spearhead, performed some astounding goalkicking feats, including claiming the elite-level record of 23 goals in a game and the WAFL record of 167 in a season.

But Naylor always shied away from the limelight and, when pressed to reveal his secrets, always declared he owed everything to his teammates.

Naylor died of cancer in 1993 at 70, so his induction into the Australian Football Hall of Fame has been an emotional experience for his family.

"It's absolutely wonderful. The whole family is over the moon," Naylor's widow Pat said.

"Bernie never played football for any rewards - he just played for the love of the game.

"He was so modest that whenever he went to a football function he'd say, 'I just want to take a back seat so that no one would even know I was there.'

"He probably wouldn't show it, but if he was still here he'd be thrilled to bits."

PICKETT WINS FIRST FAIREST AND BEST

Marlion Pickett's standout season for South Fremantle in the midfield was recognised with his winning of the WJ Hughes Medal on a night when the Bulldogs farewelled three tremendous servants.

South Fremantle finished for the third straight year in the preliminary final and gathered to celebrate the achievements of the campaign at the Esplanade Hotel Fremantle by Rydges.

The major award winners on the night saw Marlion Pickett claim the WJ Hughes Medal as the fairest and best for the league team while Trent Reed won the Roy McGuinness Medal as the fairest and best in the reserves and Enrique Aiken-Featherstone claimed the Dave Ingraham Memorial Medal and the City of Fremantle Memorial Trophy as the colts fairest and best.

The night was also a chance to celebrate the decorated careers of three former South Fremantle fairest and best winners with Ashton Hams, Ryan Cook and Shane Hockey all saying farewell to the Bulldogs.

It proved to be a night to celebrate the remarkable season of Pickett, though, who claimed his first Hughes Medal on

the back of three strong seasons as a regular defender for the Bulldogs after making his debut late in 2013.

Pickett had cemented himself as a strong member of the Bulldogs back-line over the past three years, but the chance was there for him to see what he could do in the midfield in 2018 following the departure of last year's fairest and best runner-up Tim Kelly.

Filling the void left by Kelly as a midfielder who was equally as effective on the inside and out was no easy task, but it was something that Pickett threw himself into and thrived.

Pickett ended up averaging 21.8 disposals a game including having three matches of 30 or more on top of a remarkably dominant qualifying final performance against West Perth of 26 touches and four goals.

As a result of his standout season, the 26-year-old was awarded the Hughes Medal and it's a season that should put him right in contention to join Kelly in the AFL system in 2019.

Pickett won ahead of Haiden Schloithe who backed up his dominant 2017 where he was both South Fremantle fairest and best and the Sandover Medallist with another

impressive season.

Splitting his time between half-forward and in the midfield, Schloithe again averaged 24.9 possessions a game to be South Fremantle's leading ball-winner and kicked 24 goals.

Third-place went to 2018 recruit Nick Suban with the former Fremantle AFL veteran of 156 games showing he has plenty left in the tank.

Starting the season playing at half-back, Suban finished the season playing in the midfield and was in outstanding form as a tough, contested ball winner who could also use his experience and quality to use the ball well on the outside with his left-boot.

Another player recognised on the night for what could be the best season of his 137-game WAFL career was Shaun Bewick.

Settling into a role off half-back for much of the season, Bewick was tremendous right the way through and then stepped up even further come finals time. Those performances saw Bewick named Player of the Finals after a season that included him reaching 100 games with the Bulldogs.

First year vice-captain Mason Shaw claimed the John Gerovich Trophy for kicking 57 goals.

Noah Strom made his league debut in Round 1 and never looked back getting the jobs on the opposition's best key forwards and doing so tremendously. That saw him named Best First Year Player.

Jarrold Parry made it back to play three league matches in 2018 and received the Culver Family Award for Courage and Perseverance.

Adam McIntosh was named Best Club Man.

Hockey and the Marlion Pickett highlight package running through there.

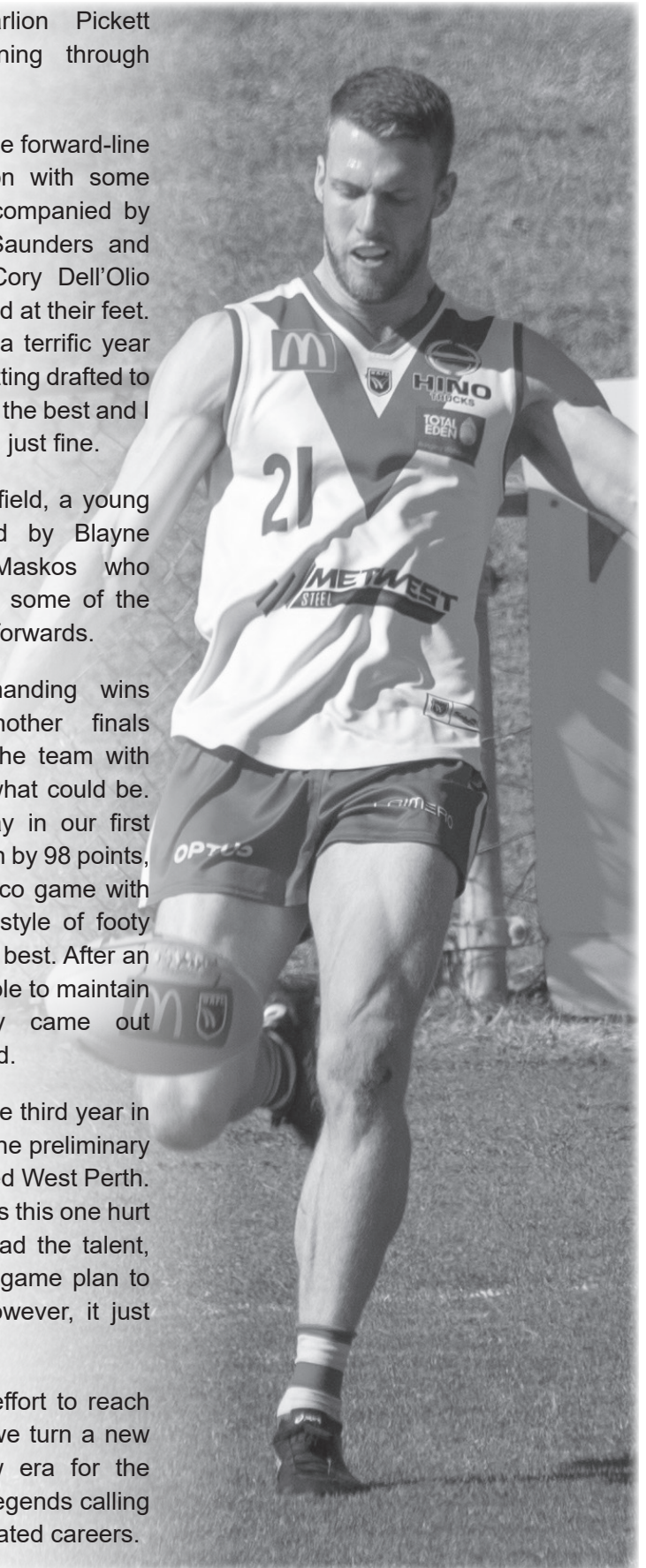

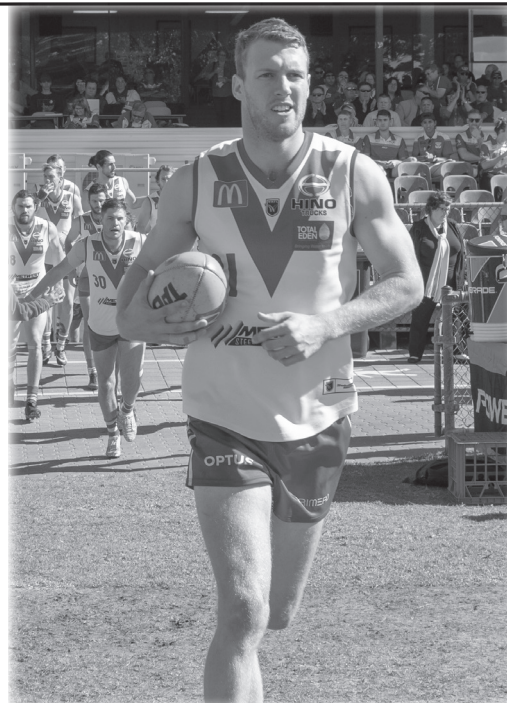
Jarrold Parry has to be commended for his loyalty and dedication through a tough career, he is a much-loved character by all and will be sorely missed.

MARLION PICKETT

A BREAKOUT SEASON TO REMEMBER

South Fremantle needed to find a midfield replacement for the brilliant Tim Kelly in 2018 but nobody could have predicted the remarkable way that Marlion Pickett took on his move onto the ball for the Bulldogs.

Kelly had a brilliant 2017 season with South Fremantle as a brilliant inside midfielder who could dominate clearances and win the ball in close, but then also break out of congestion and use his pace and kicking skills to great effect.

His performances led to him finishing runner-up to teammate Haiden Schloithe both in the WJ Hughes Medal and Sandover Medal counts for the season, and then subsequently be drafted to Geelong and have a standout rookie season in the AFL.

What it left for South Fremantle was a need to find someone to step into that midfield role left vacant by Kelly and by the end of 2018, Pickett had put together a truly remarkable season considering he had spent such limited time in that role previously.

It's not as if Pickett was coming off a low-base either. He arrived at South Fremantle during the 2013 season and went on to make a spectacular debut late in the campaign as an exciting half-forward and wingman.

It was that sort of role that he continued to play to mixed success in 2014 as he tried to find his best role at WAFL level. That soon became as a defender by 2015 and he put together three brilliant seasons where his performances in the back-line were the highlight week after week.



Not only was Pickett tough to beat one-on-one, but his ability to get across to help his fellow defenders became remarkable to watch. Combined with his blistering run and carry out of the back-line, and Pickett became one of the league's standout defenders, earning two State jumpers along the way.

But with that hole in South Fremantle's midfield, Pickett was thrown onto the ball early in 2018 by coach Todd Curley and neither player nor coach ever looked back.

Pickett's ferocious attack on the contest, both the ball and the opposition, made him a remarkable and intimidating presence but he also

showed a great ability to win the ball in close, and then grab it in congestion, breakaway and drive his team forward.

Pickett delivered some simply remarkable games of individual brilliance but never was he more dominant than in the qualifying final win over West Perth where he finished with 26 possessions and four goals.

But he also had 30 disposals, seven tackles and a goal in Round 6 against Swan Districts, 36 touches and six tackles against Claremont in Round 8, 32 possessions and six marks in Round 13 against East Perth, and even 25 disposals, eight marks, six tackles and two goals in the second semi-final loss to Subiaco.



Not only did Pickett prove himself an outstanding midfielder, but on the occasions when South Fremantle needed something different in attack, Curley threw him to the goal square and tried to isolate him one-on-one where he showed an ability to kick goals at crucial stages.

His remarkable athleticism also meant he pinch-hit in the ruck at times in 2018 for South Fremantle and his overall consistency and brilliance meant it was a season that many will fondly remember at the Bulldogs for its individual greatness from a spectacular athlete and footballer.

It was no surprise that Pickett ended up with plenty of accolades come the end of the season in recognition for his performances throughout the season, highlighted by winning his first South Fremantle fairest and best award by claiming the WJ Hughes Medal.

Pickett was also named to the WAFL Team of the Year having gone on to average 21.8 possessions a game and produce a host of match-winning and eye-catching displays.

Understandably given his season and the success of Kelly moving into the AFL, may expected Pickett to be given a chance to show what he can do at the next level.

While that didn't end up happening, he knows he couldn't have possibly done any more for his opportunity.

And looking back on 2018, he certainly enjoyed the midfield move and would enjoy more of it in 2019 in what should be a season where he becomes a 100-game player with the Bulldogs to book his name onto the famous No. 25 locker at Fremantle Community Bank Oval.

"I enjoyed it down back but I enjoy the midfield even more," Pickett said.

"I'm probably enjoying myself more this season and enjoying the success of the boys. I can't do my thing without the boys. Credit to them.

"I can't do any more than what I have done this year. I think I might go OK but if it doesn't happen this year I will be happy with what I've done and know that I did everything I could to give myself a chance."

RETIREMENTS

ALL-TIME GREATS CALL TIME

They will be long remembered as three champions of South Fremantle but Ashton Hams, Ryan Cook and Cory Dell'Olio have all played their last games for the Bulldogs.

Hams had already announced that the 2018 season would be his last ahead of one more finals campaign in his decorated career, but now the club's longest-serving captain Cook and 2009 premiership player and two-time leading goalkicker Dell'Olio have joined him.

The trio have been tremendous servants of the South Fremantle Football Club that has included sides for the past three years who finished in second position at the end of the home and away season on each occasion, and reached the preliminary final the last three years.

Beyond that, Hams and Dell'Olio were premiership teammates back in 2009 before both embarked on AFL careers at West Coast and Essendon respectively, while Cook has been at the Bulldogs since 2011.

Hams is now the last of the 2005 premiership players at South Fremantle to move on while he and Dell'Olio's departure mean there will be Bulldogs premiership players left in the team in 2019.

Another Hughes Medal winner, Shane Hockey, has decided to call time. The 2016 fairest and best winner was terrific over the past three seasons following a decorated VFL career with Frankston.

Jarrod Parry has also decided to retire and will be remembered as a tremendous and dedicated

Bulldog who overcame three knee reconstructions.

But it is Hams, Cook and Dell'Olio who will go down as all-time greats at South Fremantle with the trio having combined to play 472 matches, kick 443 goals, win three Hughes Medals, play a total of 11 games for WA with two of the three being premiership players, and life members.

Hams will go down as one of South Fremantle's all-time greats and as one of the most decorated players in the history of the club.

He began his career with colts and reserves success alongside twin brother Kyle with the pair quickly becoming regular and important members of the league team playing in the premierships of 2005 and 2009.

Ashton would win the Simpson Medal for his best on ground performance in the 2009 Grand Final win over Subiaco and that led to him being drafted to West Coast where he would go on to play 39 AFL matches.

He returned full-time to South Fremantle after deciding to call time on his AFL career and would go on to win the 2015 Hughes Medal, make his three appearances representing WA and winning a second Simpson Medal for his performance in the 2014 State Game victory against the NEAFL in Sydney.

Hams would go on to surpass the 150-game mark to earn life membership at South Fremantle and late in the 2018 season also reached the 200-game milestone becoming just the 19th player to do so, the first since Toby McGrath and the only one to have



made their debut after the turn of the century.

Hams is now a father of two and will move on to the next stage of his life, but with 205 games and 142 goals under his belt at South Fremantle including the two premierships, two Simpson Medals and three games for WA on top of the life membership, it has been a remarkable journey.

Hams is content with the decision to retire but to reach 200 games late in his career is something he'll always be proud of.

"I'm excited about it actually. I probably shouldn't be, but I am and it has been a long journey. The body is pretty fragile and I'm just ready to move on. I went around again because we were so close to a Grand Final so the aim was to win that this year," Hams said.

"It's pretty special. I probably didn't think I was going to get there and I thought last year was going to be it,

but I'm lucky enough to have played enough games this year to get there.

"Getting to 150 got me life membership and that was my real goal, but this one is special for me to run out with my daughter and do that.

"I had never done that before and I saw Kris Miller do it about eight times, but this was the first time for me and it was a big reason to want to get to 200 so we could share it as a family. She might not remember it but it will be special for me and Tess forever."

The story of Cook since joining South Fremantle for the 2011 season is an incredible one as well.

Following four years and 14 AFL matches with Collingwood, Cook made the move west for that 2011 season and made an immediate impact winning the Hughes Medal and playing State football highlighting how quickly he settled into life in WA and playing in the WAFL.

He would go on to be named captain for 2012 as well and remained in that position until the end of the 2017 season meaning he skippered the Bulldogs for 117 matches making him the longest-serving captain in the history of South Fremantle, surpassing Peter Worsfold.

Along the way, Cook won another Hughes Medal in 2013 and was runner-up on another two occasions highlighting his terrific consistency.

He would go on to play six matches all up representing the WAFL and earned life membership during the 2018 season by reaching 150 games.

All in all, Cook retires from South Fremantle having played 158 games as a dual fairest and best winner, life member, longest-serving captain and a six-time State representative making it quite the incredible journey from where he was when he first arrived in 2011.

It was a remarkable South

Fremantle journey for Cook and to be a life member, the longest-serving captain and a dual fairest and best winner mean it was the best decision of his life to make the move.

"When I first came over I had just been delisted and I wanted to try something new. I had been in the VFL for five years and I just wanted a new experience," Cook said.

"Once I was told the news that I was chopped, the thought of coming over

here was exciting and I didn't know how long it would be here for. But the first time I came down Jaymie Graham and Ryan Murphy were here, I was with Paul Hasleby, Toby McGrath, Craig White and there were just so many names.

"A few of them are life members too and Hayden North and Josh Head are others who showed me the way early on here. Then they started to move on and there's been a big transition to where we have all these



young guys here now and I'm an old, wise head.

"It's just been fun and to be a life member of this footy club, I have no family over here, so these guys and this club is my family. That includes the coaches, the staff and the fans and board members. We are called the Premier Family Club for a reason, you do get that feeling around here."

Dell'Olio put together a tremendous career with South Fremantle both before and after his time in the AFL with Essendon, but the 28-year-old has decided to call time on his 109-game, 225-goal career with the Bulldogs.

Dell'Olio made his debut with the Bulldogs in 2008 and by 2009 had become a key member of the forward-line, kicking 34 goals for the season and playing in the premiers triumph.

He then had a brilliant 2011 kicking 55 goals and playing state football with his



performances leading to his 16-game, three-year AFL career at Essendon.

He returned to South Fremantle in 2015 and had a good impact kicking 33 goals from 16 games before unfortunately he had to sit out all of 2016 due to the Essendon banned players drama.

But his return in 2017 was outstanding as he went on to boot 53 goals and then kicked another 30 in

13 games in 2018. The preliminary final loss to West Perth at Fremantle Community Bank Oval will now be the last of his WAFL career.

"It was a bit of a tough decision but it probably got to a point where being 29 might sound young still to most people in footy terms, but I just thought the time was right to finish my WAFL career and move on to other things," Dell'Olio said.

"With the other guys retiring as well, it took made me think that maybe I should stick around with us having such a young group but I then thought if I was just going to play on for that reason, then it's probably not the right decision either. So I stuck to my guns and made the call."

STEPHEN MICHAEL FOUNDATION

In March 2017 the Stephen Michael Foundation was formed by the South Fremantle Football Club to work in the communities within the clubs' metropolitan and regional recruiting zones.

A significant number of the areas within the clubs' recruiting zones are identified as low-socio economic and feature a high number of at-risk and disengaged youth. The vision of the foundation is to support these youths to become valued members of the community.

Stephen Michael is widely considered to be one of the greatest ever players from Western Australia and certainly one of the greatest in the history of South Fremantle Football Club. Throughout his life, Stephen has been a man of great values and integrity and was considered the perfect role model for which the foundation has been named.

Following its establishment in March 2017, the foundation established a key partnership with the Department of Local Government, Sport & Cultural

Industries, Sandfire Resources, and Westgold Mining to launch program activities.

2018 MILESTONES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

In early 2018 the foundation appointed Paul Mugambwa as its new General Manager, Julie Jackson as Business Development Officer and Darryl Sinclair as Umpire Academy Manager. Paul Mugambwa had spent the past seven years working at the WA Football Commission as Community Engagement Manager and was recently inducted as a South Fremantle Life Member. Julie comes from over 10 years working at the Department of Sport & Recreation as a policy advisor and Darryl boasts more than 40 years' experience working in umpiring.

In September 2018 the foundation was officially granted Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status and is officially recognised as a Public Benevolent Institution. This is a significant achievement which took over 12 months to secure.

Following a series of workshops with Board Members and Staff, the Foundation has also developed a new strategic plan. This is another significant milestone for the foundation which will drive its direction for the next three years. The Foundation's Board has also developed four sub-committees who will be responsible for driving the aspirations for the new strategic plan.

PROGRAMS & EVENTS

Since the foundations initiation in 2017, Fremantle College and the town of Meekatharra have been key partners and focal points for program development and delivery. In 2018 these partnerships have strengthened with the foundation now fully immersed on a weekly basis at Fremantle College and Meekatharra District High School. The foundation has also coordinated some amazing opportunities for participants at both schools which have been attached to school attendance and behaviour criteria.

In May the Foundation brought 20 students from Meekatharra High

School down to Perth on a special camp that included camping out at South Fremantle Football Club, a site visit at the new Fremantle Dockers training facility and a once in a lifetime opportunity to play on the new Optus Stadium in front of 60,000 people. In November the foundation took 20 students from Fremantle College up to Meekatharra for a cultural exchange camp which included a visit to a local Aboriginal community and participation in a football carnival with youth from Meekatharra. The cultural exchange camp also included students involved in the Foundations programs in Narrogin and Kojonup.

2018 has also seen the Foundation expand its reach by delivering school-based programs at Kojonup District High School, Narrogin Senior High School, Safety Bay High School, Lakelands Senior High School and Warnbro Senior High School. The Foundation has also piloted events targeting youth aged 8-17 in Carnarvon, Exmouth and Mount Magnet. During the 2018 NAIDOC Week, the Foundation partnered with Noongar Wellbeing & Sport to deliver a special Aboriginal Traditional Games

program to over 300 students across four primary schools.

Through the appointment of Darryl Sinclair as Umpire Academy Manager, the foundation has developed and implemented an innovative umpire program. The Foundation regards umpiring as a genuine opportunity for youth to earn an income, develop self-confidence, improve communication skills, stay fit and meet new friends. In just over six months, Darryl has delivered the new program to more than 600 participants across metro and regional WA.

STEPHEN MICHAEL GALA DINNER

On the 10th of November the Foundation hosted the inaugural Stephen Michael Foundation Gala Dinner to celebrate the achievements made in just a short period of time, whilst also encouraging some much-needed fundraising to support the growth of the foundation. The special evening was attended by close to 200 people and featured guest speakers, live entertainment and a live auction of some amazing items. The

foundation would like to acknowledge Sandfire Resources as the major sponsor of the event and thank everyone who came along and help make it a special night.

2019 AND BEYOND

2019 promises to be another big year for the Foundation which will include the extension of pilot programs to become fully integrated in targeted schools. The Foundation will also enhance the development of a school-to-work program which will support the development of youth in targeted regions to secure casual and part-time employment while also supporting education attainment.

Lastly, the foundation will look to increase its partnerships with local communities, government agencies, local service providers and the private sector to support the development and delivery of the foundations' programs.

BULLDOGS PAIR SHINE FOR WA

Blaine Johnson and Brock Higgins were both playing their first games for Western Australia and were strong contributors in the eventual 26-point victory against South Australia at Adelaide Oval.

Due to a combination of withdrawing through not being 100 per cent fit and missing out on final selection, Johnson and Higgins were the last two South Fremantle left to make the final WAFL team ahead of Nick Suban, Ashton Hams, Haiden Schlothe, Ben Saunders, Marlion Pickett and Ryan Cook.

It was a drought-breaking win for the WAFL in Adelaide as well Johnson and Higgins played significant roles in that final result.

Higgins started the game in the ruck and split his time between playing on the ball and then providing a strong target in attack as the game rolled on. He finished with nine possessions, four tackles and 17 hit outs which only tells part of the tale of his influence.

Johnson was then part of a dangerous WA forward-line and he ended up kicking two goals from 16 possessions, four inside-50 entries and three tackles.

WA went into the contest on Saturday at Adelaide Oval having won the past five State matches but winning in Adelaide against the Croweaters hadn't happened since a State of Origin victory for the Sandgropers in 1994.

WA then started slowly on Saturday going goalless in the opening quarter. But that soon changed with a scorching eight-goal performance in the second term to head into half-time with a four-goal advantage.

The Black Swans then withstood a charge from the SANFL team in the third term to still lead by eight points at three quarter-time.

The WAFL team was then unstoppable in the last quarter with five goals to two, including the last three majors of the game to claim the 15.12 (102) to 11.10 (76) victory.

The win is a sixth straight State Game triumph for WA following wins over the VFL in 2013 in Northam, NEAFL in 2014 in Sydney, SANFL at Lathlain Park in 2015, Tasmania at Steel Blue Oval in 2016 and then a history-making triumph last year over Victoria in Melbourne.

It is a first victory in Adelaide for WA since 1994 and South Australia's first loss on home soil in a State match since 2002.

BIG SEASON OF CELEBRATIONS

It was a huge season in terms of individual milestones at South Fremantle in 2018 highlighted by Ashton Hams reaching 200 games, Ryan Cook earning life membership and Cory Dell'Olio and Shaun Bewick both reaching the century mark.

Hams celebrated his 200-game milestone with South Fremantle in the Round 18 victory against West Perth at Fremantle Community Bank Oval.

He ran out onto the ground with daughter Emmi and by doing so, he became just the 19th player to reach 200 games in the history of the Bulldogs and the only one to have done so who made their debut this century.

Hams made his South Fremantle league debut in 2004 and along the way, he played in the 2005 and 2009 premierships alongside twin brother Kyle while winning the Simpson Medal as best afield in the 2009 Grand Final win against Claremont.

That led to him earning a crack in the AFL at the West Coast Eagles where he played 39 games before returning full-time to South Fremantle in 2014.

Since coming back to the Bulldogs, he has earned life membership by reaching 150 games, won the 2015 WJ Hughes Medal as fairest and best and represented WA three times including winning a Simpson Medal.

Hams is now a father of two as well alongside wife Tess so felt that after reaching 200 games in 2018, the time was right to enter retirement.

The journey of Cook at South Fremantle has been remarkable since he arrived after his time for Collingwood in the AFL ended following the 2010 season.

He arrived in 2011 and by Round 14 this year against Claremont, he brought up his 150-game milestone to reach life membership that now means

the world to him at the Bulldogs.

Cook made an immediate impact upon arrival at the Bulldogs too in that 2011 season going on to play State football and win the WJ Hughes Medal all as part of a team that reached the finals.

Cook was named captain the following year and remained in the role up until the end of 2017 when he decided the time was right to pass the baton on to the next generation of leaders while he was still playing.

Along the way, Cook captained South Fremantle on a record 117 occasions while also winning another fairest and best award and being runner-up on another two occasions and playing for WA in six of his first seven WAFL seasons.

He had enjoyed his 100th game celebrations with a win against Peel back in 2016, but it was becoming a life member that Cook really wanted to achieve having seen what it had meant to so many people over the years at the annual Life Member functions.

He achieved that goal during the win in NAIDOC Round and went on to

finish his career with 158 games and 76 goals for South Fremantle when he announced his retirement at season's end.

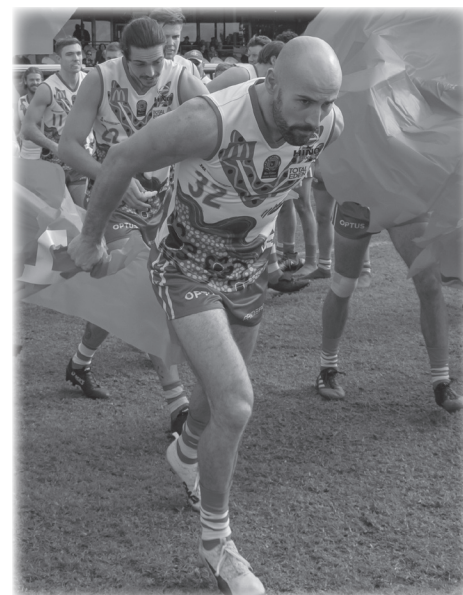
It was quite the journey for Dell'Olio to become a 100-game player for South Fremantle but it became one of the highlights of his career when he booked his name on the No. 3 locker in the WA Day Foundation Derby win over East Fremantle.

Dell'Olio made his league debut with South Fremantle in 2008 and a year later he was cementing himself in a forward-line that would take the Bulldogs to the 2009 premiership.

He kicked 34 goals in that season and then by 2011, was a genuine star in the WAFL playing State football for the first time and going on to kick 55 goals to earn himself a chance in the AFL at Essendon.

Dell'Olio went on to play 16 games and kick 16 goals in the AFL with the Bombers before returning to South Fremantle in 2015, kicking 33 goals and playing his second game for WA.

Unfortunately he had to sit out 2016,

but returned in outstanding fashion in 2017 kicking 53 goals as part of a South Fremantle team that reached the preliminary final.

After a slow start to 2018 through suspension, he went on to play 13 games and kick 30 goals including celebrating the WA Day Foundation Derby win in what was his 100th game.

Like fellow milestone men Cook and Hams, Dell'Olio has also since announced his retirement.

Bewick didn't quite know what to expect when joining a new club when he came to South Fremantle after beginning his WAFL career at West Perth and continuing his family's legacy at the Falcons.

But the attraction of playing under then coach Paul Hasleby and a new group of teammates enticed him to the Bulldogs and he has never looked back since.

He did bring up 100 WAFL games last year, fittingly in a South Fremantle win against West Perth, but it was bringing up the century for the Bulldogs that he set his sights on.

Bewick reached that mark in the Round 11 loss to Peel Thunder

and it's a feat he deserves to be tremendously proud of given the dedication and commitment he has shown to fight through some tough moments along the journey.

"It's especially guys like Toby Bairstow, Googs, Jarrod Parry and to a lesser extent Dell who was drafted the year I went there, but those guys made me feel so welcome immediately and they've become some of the best mates in my life. From the start, I just felt so welcome and I've loved it ever since," Bewick said.

"It actually meant a really great deal to me. Playing the 100 in total was a good milestone to chalk off, but the

100 at the club means a lot to me. I loved my time at West Perth and my family is always going to be West Perth, but this kind of makes me feel like I really belong at South Freo with getting my name on the locker and everything.

"A few of my best mates at the club like Adam Guglielmana, Cory Dell'Olio, Toby Bairstow, Adam McIntosh, Craig White and even Hamsy, Schloithy and Saundo, my name is up there with them now as 100-game players and it means a lot to me. Hopefully we can still achieve that ultimate success together but it's good knowing we went through that era and all played 100 games."

DEBUTANTS

While South Fremantle finished second on the WAFL ladder at the end of the home and away season for a third straight season, it was a year with an eye to the future as well.

There were a total of 10 players who made their South Fremantle debuts in 2018, with seven of those playing their first senior games of WAFL football.

Noah Strom became one of the stories of the season for South Fremantle, ironically earning his debut in the opening game of the season with older brother Zac ill.

Having played 58 reserves matches over the past three seasons, he was rewarded with a debut to open 2018 and never looked back.

He went on to be a rock as a key defender for the Bulldogs, locking down some of the league's best key forwards and becoming one of the best in his position in the WAFL.

Nick Suban was another to make his South Fremantle debut in Round 2 against Subiaco, despite being a triple WAFL premiership player. The former Fremantle AFL veteran of 156 games went on to have a superb first season with the Bulldogs, finishing third in fairest and best voting.

Zac Dent and Blair Della Franca were two other players who had previously played in the WAFL at East Perth. They both showed signs they can be part of the future of South Fremantle with what they produced in 2018.

Daniel Cabassi earned his debut in Round 5 against Claremont in Albany and the lively small forward and pinch-hit midfielder looked at home at league level.

Glenn Byron came into 2018 as the reigning colts fairest and best winner, and stepped into senior ranks impressively starting in Round 6 against Swan Districts.

Josh Collard was another who had put together an impressive apprenticeship to earn his league chance. After a good colts career, he had played 49 reserves matches before making his league debut in Round 15 against Subiaco.

HOW THEY PERFORMED IN 2018

The performance of Tim Kelly as an AFL rookie with the Geelong Cats soon became one of the stories of the 2018 season across the country.

Kelly came right through the ranks at South Fremantle, having a successful colts career before doing a reserves apprenticeship and then going on to make his league debut in 2013.

By 2014, he had become a regular member of South Fremantle's midfield and had two strong seasons in 2014 and 2015 before he really began to find his feet and become a star for the Bulldogs by 2016.

He had a tremendous 2016 season and then went up a whole other level in 2017 to end up finishing runner-up to teammate Haiden Schloithe in both the WJ Hughes Medal and Sandover Medal voting.

That earned him a belated AFL opportunity in 2018 and he grabbed it with both hands with Geelong, starting from the moment he first stepped out onto the field in blue-and-white hoops.

He went on to play all 23 games

for the season with the Cats, averaged 22.9 possessions across those matches and kicked 24 goals.

It was a season that showed that his 93-game apprenticeship at WAFL league level with South Fremantle had him well-equipped to immediately perform in the AFL. Remarkably, he ended up equal runner-up in Geelong's best and fairest voting to behind Mark Blicavs and tied with Patrick Dangerfield.

Jarrold Pickett had a good start to his first season with Carlton but ended up just playing seven games for two goals.

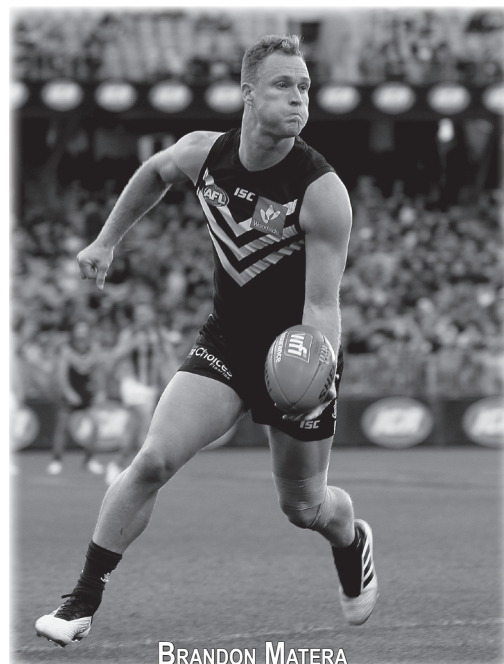
Jarrold Garlett was also at the Blues in 2018 after a season back with South Fremantle in 2017. He played 11 games for five goals.

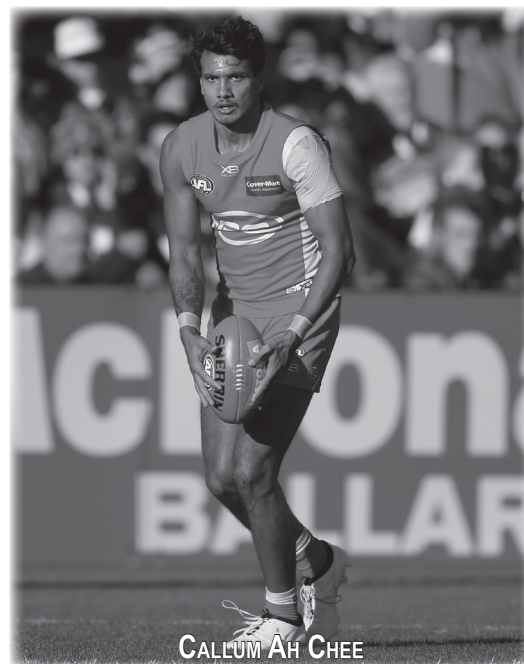
Brandon Matera returned closer to home joining Fremantle in 2018 after beginning his AFL career with the Gold Coast Suns.

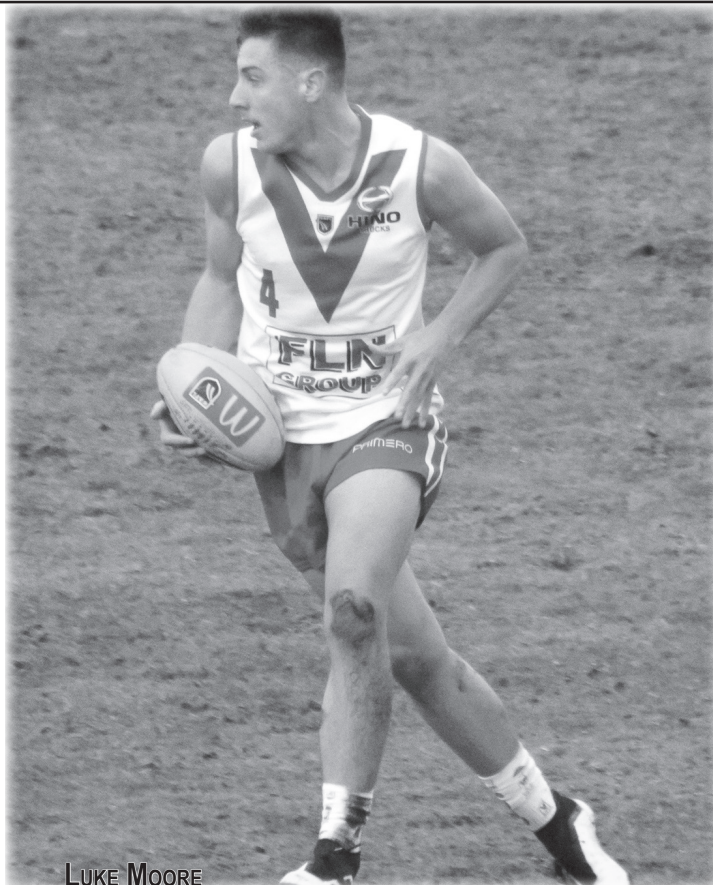
business and family ventures.

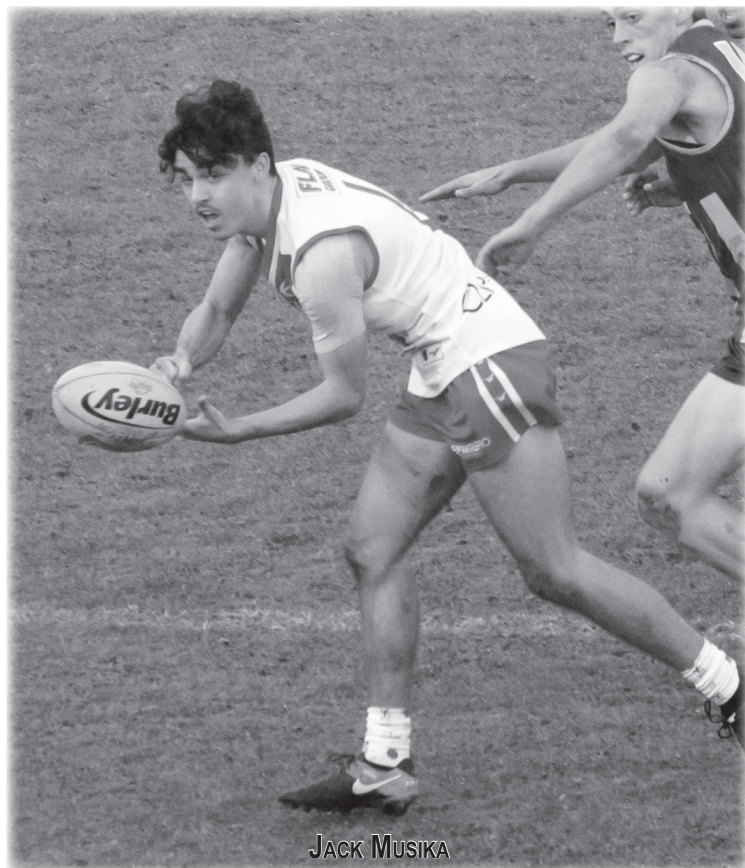

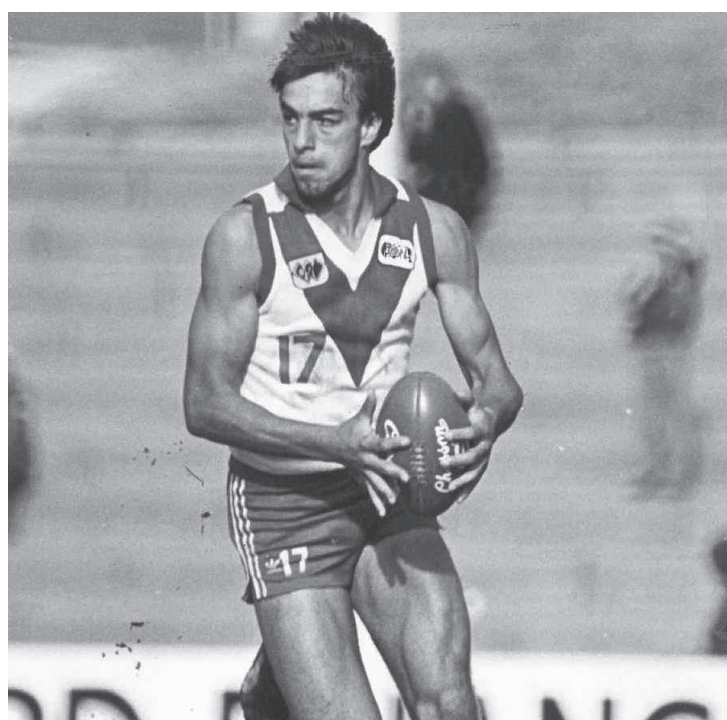

FINANCIAL REPORT

In 2018 we saw a full year cash profit result of \$27,780 and net profit and loss of \$15,688 after depreciation and amortisation of \$43,467.

This represents an improved position on last year's result to the tune of around \$24,000 and whilst there is some positive news in that result, it was still a difficult year in terms of fundraising.

The key areas which did not meet budget were as follows:

Sponsorship - \$422,130 versus 2017 Financial Year result of \$425,630 (2018 budget \$453,000)

Auction On-line - \$11,322 versus a full year budget of \$20,000 (No Auction held in 2017)

Club raffle - \$9418 versus a full year budget of \$13,500 (No significant club raffle held in 2017)

Merchandise - \$28,919 versus 2017

Financial Year result of \$38,706 (2018 budget of \$43,155)

In 2018 we saw all nine WAFL club transition into a new standardised chart of accounts to enable more accurate benchmarking between the clubs. This change came with some difficulties as the coding changes meant very little correlation between the 2017 and 2018 reporting. As an example, 11 individual items in 2017 were all coded into 'Sundry Expenses' in 2018 and this will not be the case in 2019 as there were far too many transactions coded into sundry items.

Some positive results were seen with savings in functions and events costs along with our new partnership with Benny's Bar and Café. Some of the key wins from this partnership are as follows; payroll tax savings, enhanced game day food and beverage offering and a significant decrease in function food costs. Our Board are currently considering a longer-term agreement with Benny's to maximise and grow on

the improvements seen in 2018 and the potential to activate the venue over the summer months.

In September 2018 we launched, in partnership with Andrew Ryan of Cool Perth Nights, a live music venue within our facility (Griff John Hall). Whilst this will take some time to build, we are confident it will be a great revenue source for the organisation, whilst also adding a great atmosphere in what is an underutilised part of the building. Early indications are that it will be a success given there are very few band rooms in Perth with the capacity to service up to 700 patrons.

Overall, we need the continued support of our members and supporters with any of the club initiatives such as large raffles, auctions and events so please get involved whenever you have the opportunity.
