PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2018 was my first year as President of the WACFL and I want to start by saying what a fantastic honour it is to follow in the footsteps of a great bunch of long-serving WACFL presidents in Bud Byfield, John Lussick, Ken Baxter and Terry House.

After 10 years as the WACFL's president, Terry stood down from his position in March and continued as an executive member. I'm sure all members would like to join me in congratulating and thanking him for his efforts and leadership over this time and his contribution to country football. Terry has provided great leadership to the executive, has represented the best interests of country football and has been a great supporter of representative football.

This year the executive has gone about its role of delivering the recommendations of the 2017-2019 Strategic Plan with vigour and we have seen some positive developments in regard to Club Development, Governance and the Talent Pathway. There has been a great deal of work done creating new and professional policy and tools to support our network.

The Wheatbelt Review was a report we produced as a recommendation from the Strategic Plan and something close to my heart, as we painted a picture of what we believe is happening to football in the Wheatbelt with less people living in towns and playing the game. To support our anecdotal concepts, we did a census to see actual trends over one weekend.

Importantly, we gave each League suggestions on strategies they could

implement to improve the efficiency of their League to help keep the Clubs sustainable. I'd like to continue to encourage our members from all over the state to read this report as it has relevance to all Country Football Leagues.

The Governance of the WACFL has been closely looked at this year and we are now seeking the support of Members to endorse a new constitution for the WACFL in line with changes put in place from the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety.

There will be further developments rolled out early in the 2019 season which are a culmination of some of the hard work of the Executive and Staff from the 2018 season, and we are comfortable that the WACFL is on the right track to better support our network.

Commercially, we had a pleasing end to 2018 as we continue to have the support of our loyal sponsors and have re-signed licencing agreements with six companies for the following three years. The WACFL's financials have been audited and show a net profit of \$40,656. Importantly this will allow the WACFL to put aside an amount of \$40,000 at the beginning of season 2019 to be directed towards a new initiative named the Player Legacy Fund to better protect our members in times of hardship. We look forward to providing further details on this initiative in the coming months.

The WACFL's Salary Cap has now been in place for two seasons and we believe it has been a positive for our Clubs in

helping them manage the inflation and expectations around player payments. The bylaws continue to evolve, and we are confident that the vast majority of our Clubs are respectful of these bylaws and abiding by them. We feel there are significant consequences for noncompliance and hope that the risk and consequence of getting caught will outweigh a Club's desire to buy a premiership.

2018 also saw very deserving people inducted into the WACFL's Life Members Club, Gary Bovell and Kellie Morley. Gary received his Life Membership for his long and valuable involvement with country football as assistant trainer and then head trainer for our state programs between 2000 and 2018. Kellie has been the WACFL's longest serving staff member (starting in 1997) and in 2017 reached a 20-year milestone the members believe warranted life membership.

The country staff had a superb year and continues to provide some fantastic innovations to improve country football for the executive to consider.

Finally, I'd like to thank my fellow executive members for their contribution to country football in 2018. As a collective we remain passionate about supporting grassroots football to continue the great work the volunteers provide week to week in facilitating more than 3,000 senior matches that take place around country WA each year.

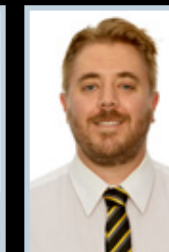

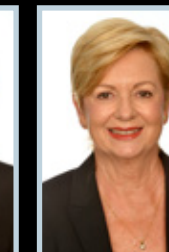

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

I believe the 2018 season has been the most productive year of our Staff and Executive since I commenced in 2011, which can largely be attributed to the clear direction that the 2017-19 strategic plan has given us as a collective.

The 2018 season saw significant steps taken to enhance the governance of our competitions, with five leagues adopting streamlined competition rules in line with WACFL bylaws and recommendations. This simple process allows the WACFL to provide more comprehensive administrative support, which we've found has helped reduce duplication for volunteers, assisted with their competition management and is certainly an avenue the WACFL is keen to progress with other Leagues in the future.

Clubs, Leagues and the WACFL have also had to be mindful of State Legislation, ensuring all incorporated associations update their rules in line with the department's minimum standards. This process must be completed prior to June 30, 2019, and the WACFL has supported our members by providing templates to Clubs and Leagues which we believe to contain the best practice governance principles for our network. The WACFL will also be transitioning to a new constitution following the 2019 Annual General meeting.

Club Development has been another key pillar of our 2018 program and, in February, the WACFL loaded a suite of videos onto our website to give our volunteers easy access to club development resources in a digestible format. It is envisaged that this strategy, combined with WACFL policy, Club Manuals, the website, face to face sessions such as the Regional Roadshows, and regular outreach, will allow us to better support our 150 Club networks with the challenges that arise for them from time to time.

Player Payments continue to be topical around the southern half of the State and the WACFL continued to carry out audits, investigations and reviews on all clubs paying players. With our bylaws now having been in place for two full seasons, we believe they have been effective in reducing inflationary pressures on Clubs, which was our main objective when the bylaws were introduced. The Board is committed to ramping up its powers and investigations in 2019 to help ensure integrity with regard to the policing of the bylaws.

Participation numbers in senior regional WA grew by 1% in 2018. The establishment of senior female football in the GNFL, GSFL, PFNL and Central and East Kimberley

competitions was a highlight in an area of our game that continues to rapidly expand. This, on top of the SWFL and West Kimberley which commenced female competitions in 2017, demonstrates WACFL Leagues are embracing women's football with all Leagues reporting a positive flow on to the football and broader community from starting competitions. Whilst we don't envisage all our Leagues having female competitions in the next few years, there is still opportunity for more Leagues to embrace female football in the coming years.

Hockey and Netball continue to be popular winter sport options for females in Agricultural WA and discussions continued around working together with these associations to ensure better facilitation of winter sport, especially in the Wheatbelt. Better administered country sport was a large component of the WACFL's Wheatbelt Review document.

The Review was a critical discussion paper released by the WACFL in August and summarised some of the concerning trends being experienced by Leagues and Clubs within the Wheatbelt, predominately around population trends and the threat to football's sustainability. The review provided a significant amount of data

which allows our stakeholders the first real opportunity to make informed decisions based on relevant statistics.

The Landmark Country Football Championships returned to a one weekend format in Perth and appeared to be a format our network supports. This year we were blessed with great weather and good grounds which, when combined with the strong sides Leagues brought to town, made it one of the best Championships in recent times. This year we hosted a composite Regional Allstars side in Division 3 which had players invited from non-participating Leagues, giving all WACFL players the opportunity to partake in the Championships. Congratulations to the Southwest (League and Colts), Goldfields (Division 2) and Eastern Districts (Division 3) who were this year's victors.

We celebrated our 20-year relationship with the Insurance Commission of WA promoting the Belt up. message which has now become synonymous with Country Football. Every player at the Landmark Championships was given a special Belt up. showbag to celebrate this anniversary.

The Landmark Championships gave us a great lead into our New Holland State Country match versus the SACFL on

Adelaide Oval in late July. This year's program saw three lead-in matches against the WAAFL Under 23s, the WA State 18s and the Goldfields FL to help commemorate 125 years since the discovery of gold in the region.

After a fantastic lead-in and taking away one of our strongest sides, the team performed very admirably in Adelaide, but unfortunately went down by five points. Congratulations to Craig Walker and his team of support staff and Brent Sheridan for his organisation of this year's talent programs.

As well as overseeing our network and managing a number of our own programs, the WACFL Staff and Executive was also invited to contribute towards WAFC projects as part of its Structural Review agenda. This year's projects have included The Talent Pathway, Points Systems, Valuation of Community Football and the Broader Governance of Country Football. Ensuring our network is adequately represented at the table of future discussions is obviously critically important for our board to ensure our stakeholders' best interests are put forward.

I'd like to acknowledge the performance of WACFL staff members Brent Sheridan,

Robyn Payne, Kellie Morley and volunteer Benjamin Ralph who all continued to work hard for our constituents' best interests. Again, I think our small team had a fantastic year and I'm very proud of the staff we have on board and what we've been able to deliver. Gratitude and congratulations must also go to the members of the Executive for their support in the previous 12 months with some of them travelling over four hours to attend meetings each month.

The 2018 season was my final year as General Manager of the WA Country Football League as I explore other opportunities in 2019. Since 2011, I've been lucky enough to see the state a couple of times over, and the opportunity to manage country football for the past seven seasons has been my career highlight and a time in my life I will remember fondly.

I will continue to support country football in differing ways in my future and would like to wish all those great people I've been lucky enough to meet on my journey in football all the best. I hope I have been able to positively influence country football and help set it up to flourish in years to come.

WAFc EXECUTIVE MANAGER ENGAGEMENT & COMMUNITY FOOTBALL

The 2018 Football Season was another successful year in football across Western Australia with in excess of 342,000 participants playing the game either through Community Football Clubs or our school system. This is a significant achievement!

Community Club Football continues to be the heartbeat of local communities. Football clubs are often the centre of a town, and the impact of a local club on the community is significant. This is why the WAFc will continue to focus its energy and efforts on enhancing club football. There are challenges in front of country football with shifting populations, other opportunities for participants, and a changing demographic, however football must be innovative and not afraid to look outside of the traditional formats of the game in order to be sustainable. Whether that be embracing female football, shifting from a traditional 18-a-side format, or significantly changing the approach to paid players, there are opportunities for clubs and leagues to do things differently and to thrive.

Female Football has continued to grow and develop with close to 100,000 females now playing football. The work of Country Leagues in introducing female competitions should be applauded, and I would encourage leagues who have yet to take that step to look at ways in which you can introduce female competitions in the next year. It will certainly have a significant impact on your league and local communities.

Congratulations to all leagues involved in the WACFL Landmark Country Football Championships. The Championships is a fantastic opportunity to play representative football and to fly the flag of your local competition. I would encourage all participants, if they have the opportunity,

to play in the championships as it is a unique and valued opportunity. The ongoing support of Landmark in this carnival (since 1974) is one of the longest standing partnerships in football, and both the WACFL and Landmark should be recognised for the significant benefit that this partnership enables.

Throughout 2018, the WAFc and the WACFL have begun a process to review the governance model for country football with a view to reducing duplication, streamlining efficiencies and establishing a clearer pathway for all players. This will continue through 2019, with the ultimate aim of improving country football right across Western Australia.

In 2019, the focus of the Engagement & Community Football team will be on three key priorities:

- **Community Club Football** – we will continue our drive to ensure that communities and clubs grow and develop through recognising the importance of community club structures – the heartbeat of our game.
- **Participant Retention** – we cannot underestimate the importance of creating the right club-based environment to ensure that all participants are retained through the game. From creating positive game day environments to the role of a coach, the WAFc will continue to drive strategies to enhance our retention rates.
- **Connection through the Pathway** – in order for there to be seamless pathways in the game, all segments of football must work closely together to ensure that the participant is retained. From the connection of the WAFc Clubs to their regions and districts, to

junior and senior competitions working together, to a closer alignment of the WACFL and RFDC's – there is work to be done right across this area of connection.

To WACFL President John Shadbolt and the WACFL Board – thank you for your drive and commitment to country football across the State. Volunteers continue to be a critical component of the game, and to you and your board I say thank you.

To the WACFL Staff - Joe Georgiades, Brent Sheridan, Robyn Payne and Kellie Morley – your energy and long-standing commitment to country football provides significant benefit across the state, and I would like to thank you for all your efforts throughout 2018.

To the WAFc Regional Development Managers (RDM's) and the Regional Football Development Councils (RFDC's), I also want to recognise your efforts and work to enhance country football. The councils and the RDM's work tirelessly to ensure that the pathway in the game is supported, and continue to be a significant asset to football across the state.

Finally, to all the clubs, leagues, competitions, volunteers and participants across the state, congratulations on a fantastic year and for all your ongoing efforts, and a sincere thank you for your contribution to football. In excess of 48,000 volunteers are involved in this game week in and week out, and without the role that you play in football, we wouldn't be able to achieve the outcomes that we do. Thank you!


