PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2020 AS WE ALL KNOW HAS BEEN A VERY DIFFERENT AND DIFFICULT YEAR NOT JUST FOR COUNTRY FOOTBALL BUT THE ENTIRE WORLD. COVID BROUGHT WITH IT MANY CHALLENGES AND CHANGED THE WAY WE WORKED AND OUR ABILITY TO RUN VIABLE FOOTBALL COMPETITIONS.

The WACFL Board and Country Football Team had a very busy and difficult year. This was made even more difficult for our team in Perth and the Regional Football Specialists having to work from home for a large part of the year. I am pleased to report that the Country Football team came through the crisis in good shape and are continuing in their roles with the WAFC, whilst many others in the industry weren't so fortunate.

The Board would particularly like to acknowledge the mountain of work and support that our Executive Manager of Country Football, Affiliates and Facilities Tom Bottrell gave to the Staff, the Board and all our Stakeholders across Western Australia. Tom probably wondered from time to time about his decision to take this position, but we are pleased that he did.

I would like to acknowledge the WACFL Sponsors for their unwavering support through this pandemic. Healthway and the Think Mental Health program, Nutrien Ag Solutions and BASF, Insurance Commission of WA through Belt Up, New Holland, CBH Group, Regional Mens Health and West Coast Poly all continued their sponsorship programs during 2020. The WACFL family thanks and recognises the enormous contribution our sponsors make. I would like to recognise the efforts of Mr Steve Wright from Nutrien Ag Solutions who is always coming up with ideas with how to attract more sponsorship.

The biggest question for 2020 for WACFL Leagues was whether to play or not, what would the season look like and the possibility of more Government restrictions. Approximately half of the WACFL Leagues played a shortened season. Players from Leagues that did not play were able to participate and bolster teams from Leagues that did play. I am hopeful that all Leagues will back in full swing for 2021.

The WACFL Board has been busy working on bringing new programs and sponsorship to Country Football. Joe Georgiades former WACFL GM along with Tom Bottrell and Ian Stanley have been building a relationship with UWA and The Young Lives Matter Foundation. This Foundation wrote the survey, that was sent to all Country Footballers, to assess the different aspects of the Mental Health of Football players in Leagues that did conduct a season and the Leagues that did not play. Thank you to those who responded. The data collected has been analysed and shows a significant positive difference in the players who were

able to participate in a season of football. This is just the start of the journey with UWA so please be proactive and avail yourself to any further surveys.

I would like to acknowledge and look forward to working with Michael Roberts who has taken over as CEO of the WAFC from Gavin Taylor. Gavin was a great advocate for Country Football and the WACFL Board wish him and his family well for their future.

I would like to thank my fellow Executive members for their contribution to Country Football in 2020. There have been two Executive Members who have decided to retire from the WACFL Board. Noel Miguel is a Life Member of the WACFL and has served on the Board for 17 years. He has been heavily involved in the State Senior and Colts programs and helped oversee the win over South Australia Country in 2019. I would like to thank Noel for his contribution to the Board and to Country Football. Geoff Davis from the Kimberley has also decided to retire after one-term and I would like to thank Geoff for his contribution to country football, especially in the Kimberley and wish him the best for his future endeavours.

It is my pleasure to welcome two new Board Members for 2021. They are Helen Ockerby and Craig Parkin. Helen is from the Kimberley and has had a long association with Football in her Region and Craig has just moved south from the Pilbara where he spent time as President of the RFDC and other numerous other football related positions.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the extended Country football team (including WAFC Event staff), Tom, Kane, Brent, Josh, Kellie, Zoe and Dan for the very professional way they have navigated Country Football through this year, well done.

Thank you also to the hard-working Football Club volunteers throughout Western Australia for the jobs you do to promote and foster Football in your communities. We are all looking forward to Football returning to our communities this year.

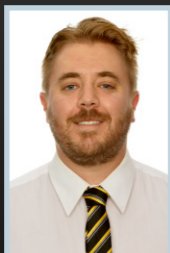

EXECUTIVE MANAGER COUNTRY FOOTBALL & FACILITIES

Put simply, 2020 was an incredibly challenging year for our organisation. Whilst many industries have performed well during the global pandemic, the WAFC has had to cut nearly one in every four roles within the organisation to meet our projected revenue budget for 2021. This will mean that some of the areas of support that were in place previously may have changed as a result, so it is important that the entire football industry is cognisant of that and remains understanding of the impact 2020 has had on our industry.

From a regional football perspective, in a year that financially impacted the football industry significantly, the WACFL partner's loyalty and support ensured a healthy full year profit. This could not have been achieved without every one of our partners remaining engaged and committing funding regardless of whether football was played or not. As a way of ensuring our partners received brand recognition and acknowledgement during the lockdown period, six weeks of television commercials were aired throughout Western Australia with the specific theme of 'Thank You'. We really do thank our corporate partners for supporting the industry through so much uncertainty at that time.

Football

The 2020 season saw 15 of our 25 senior leagues go ahead, with the remaining 10 deciding not to play due to uncertainty of whether spectators would be permitted to attend matches, and the unknown burden of increased hygiene protocol costs. On behalf of the WACFL and WAFC, I thank everyone involved in our game regardless of whether your league went ahead or not in 2020. It is a consuming industry and whilst the leagues that went ahead were generally happy that

they did, we fully supported the decision of those leagues that chose not to play. Early indications are that all leagues intend on playing in 2021, so we are very hopeful that West Australians continue to be vigilant regarding COVID re-entering our community, to ensure we can have a return to normality.

Finances

As referred to above, a profit of \$122,655 FY was a very pleasing result in a tough environment. Key reasons for the strong result were that none of the Nutrien Ag Country Championships, CBH Colts Championships or New Holland State Game were conducted, so with our corporate partners fully committing, our revenue position remained strong. We are confident these events will go ahead in 2021, where we have a FY budgeted profit forecast of \$3,150 and we will continue to provide league funding.

WAFC Restructure

The Country Football and Facilities team were fortunate during the WAFC restructure, with our team remaining largely unchanged. The WACFL Board must be acknowledged and thanked for the care and support provided to our staff during the long period of uncertainty in 2020 and I know each of them is very appreciative of this.

In 2020 we farewelled Glenn Omodei from his role as Regional Specialist – South West and welcomed Nathan Douch into that position. Nathan was the successful internal candidate having been in the role of Auskick and Schools Co-Ordinator – South West for the

previous two years. Daniel Murphy joined the team as part of the overall WAFC restructure, having only been in the role for two days prior to the organisation going into full lockdown in April. Dan's role is Affiliates and Club Development Co-Ordinator, and we look forward to utilising his skill set to support our regional staff. Welcome Nathan and Dan.

Insurance

Insurance costs are a regular voiced concern from our members. To summarize the 2020 and 2021 schedule of insurance charges, please find the following information.

The 'Club Asset Protection' and 'Club Public Liability' components of club's insurance were charged at 100% regardless of football going ahead or not in 2020. Those two components are not related to football being played so were charged accordingly. 'Personal Accident Protection' was not charged for 2020 if your league did not go ahead. If you played in a reduced season, the intention of Marsh Insurance/AFL is for credits to be applied to your 2021 Insurance premium. Further details will be communicated to Leagues as soon as we have been updated by the AFL.

WACFL Strategic Plan

The WACFL Board and staff have been developing a new strategic plan with John Ipsen over the last six months, with the intention to present the final version in February. The new strategy is built around the following key pillars.



WACFL Sponsors

The corporate partners of the WACFL have been unbelievable and I sincerely thank them for the support they provided to country football. Regional Governance

A joint meeting was held in late November between the WACFL Board and RFDC Chairs. This was the first in a series of meetings being proposed for 2021 with the intent to have one overarching Board which oversees all regional football from Auskick through to Seniors. The current model has some duplication and with volunteers becoming increasingly difficult to engage, the intent is to streamline the regional football governance structure from the beginning to the end of the pathway in line with our regional staffing structure. The wider regional football industry will be kept updated throughout 2021 as this model progresses.

UWA Young Lives Matter survey

Many of you participated in a Mental Health survey in September and October last year, which was conducted by UWA's Young Lives Matter Foundation, in conjunction with the WACFL. The survey was directed at two specific subsets; 'those that played football in 2020' and 'those that did not play football in 2020' to understand the mental health impacts on both groups and whether football played a strong part in improved mental health.

The report clearly showed the physical and mental health benefits associated with football and the connection it provides. There were 29

recommendations in the report and an overview will be presented as part of a rollout plan in February.

Many of the recommendations align with the objectives of our 'Think Mental Health' partnership and our focus will be on co-ordinating delivery of mental health training and support to our regional leagues.

Thank you to our wonderful staff who handled 2020 unbelievably well and continue to drive regional football on behalf of the WACFL. Your support and strong character is appreciated and valued by the WACFL & WAFC Executive

I would also like to acknowledge the Board for their input, support and friendship and I look forward to continuing to make a positive difference to regional football with the Board and staff in 2021.

As we all know, football is a consuming industry so I must thank my family for understanding the time and energy commitments required to perform my role. It is certainly not a nine to five industry and they are fully understanding of that.

To the leagues and clubs' volunteers, you keep the game ticking and without you, we do not have football providing the social and physical connection that keeps communities healthy. Thank you for what you do, and if every volunteer can engage just one other person to lend a hand, that will go a long way to easing the workload on individuals and ensuring Regional Football flourishes.

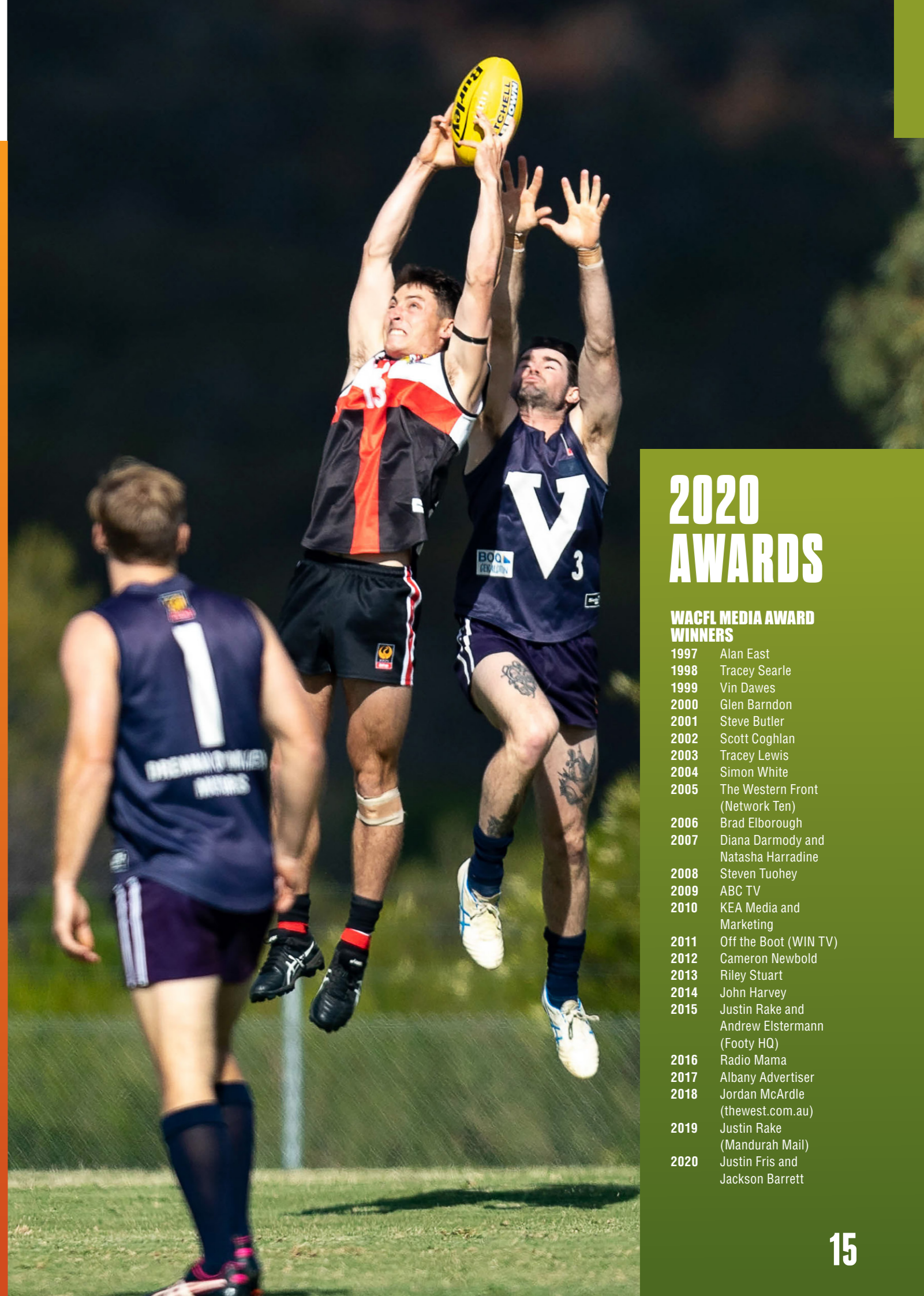
