- Returning the Tavern Licence back to the Club.
- Upgrading the Tiger Bar to create a magnificent social space for the community.
- Doubling the size of the lettable gym space for REVO FITNESS; and negotiating our partnership with REVO FITNESS for them to become our first ever stadium sponsor.
- Creating a new Boardroom, that is also available for hire, and use by Sponsors on match days.
- Installing windows into the R.J. Kyle Legends Lounge to add much needed atmosphere on game day.
- Welcoming the Claremont Women's Football Club into the Club, and celebrating their premiership success this year.
- Paying off \$800,000 of debt.

- Leading the charge at the WAFC level to bring back the Talent & Development Department from the WAFC to be part of the Club.

- Oval Lighting upgrade approved and paid for and awaiting installation.
- Creating the 1st Friday in September Annual Luncheon with over 250 people attending annually
- Amazing staff/volunteers that put their heart and soul into the Club to make us a destination and a place to be enjoyed.

## FOOTBALL OPERATIONS MANAGER

### KEPLER BRADLEY

After a couple of really tough years following the Covid-19 outbreak, we managed to get a full season completed but not without a couple of scares. Our round 2 fixture against Subiaco saw us make 13 changes from our round 1 win over West Perth due to Covid. We would go on to win that game despite a lot of people giving us no chance and suggesting to the club we should postpone the game. This win set up a great belief within the club, with Ashley Prescott steering the Senior group to another finals series despite the occasional player and coach ruled out due to Covid protocols.

Darren Harper did a great job helping our young Reserves group register 12 wins in the home & away season and finishing 2nd on the ladder despite an indifferent run of form at the backend of the year. Our first final was against an experienced South Fremantle side where the lead changed on a number of occasions. Ronin O'Connor and Samuel Alvarez controlled the midfield while Max Minear was at his best kicking 4 goals to see us eventually run out winners by 13 points. We then headed to Joondalup to take on West Perth and at half time there were 2 points separating the teams, West Perth proved too strong and piled on 9 goals to 1 to run out 55 point winners.

The preliminary final was against Subiaco who proved to be too good from the start and not only went on to beat us they ended up winning the grand final. Jack Beeck provided great leadership and direction to such a young and developing group. Samuel Alvarez was ultra-consistent all year and Max Minear's finish to the year was outstanding, providing a target up forward. Alex Pearce's ball use off half back was a feature and Kieran Gowdie dominated the ruck giving our midfield first use. The football played by the Reserves team early in the year certainly had a positive influence on the League side, with a number of players getting League opportunities throughout the year helping the League side finish 3rd on the premiership table.

Our League side started the season off well winning 7 of our first 9 games of the year with an attacking, quick and direct style of play. The middle to late part of the year we showed some indifferent form but in saying this the WAFL competition has proved once again that the competition is incredibly close and if you are off a couple of percent you can lose to anyone as every side found out during this period. Our round 18 loss at home to East Fremantle ultimately cost us an opportunity to finish the season on top of the premiership table as ladder leaders, West Perth lost to Swan Districts in the same round. We finished the season 3rd on the ladder, where we found ourselves playing East Fremantle at New Choice Homes Park in the semi-final.

Our playing group was stunned by East Fremantle's intensity and ferocity around the football for the 2nd time in 3 weeks and not only did we lose comprehensively, Steven Miller hyperextended his knee adding more pressure to a backline that was already under sized. We turned our attention to Peel Thunder, who had 12 AFL listed players and our match committee had to make a number of positional changes due to injury and form. Timm House and Jye Bolton's move to the backline proved to be a key factor in the remaining finals series. This allowed Max Minear to be a target up forward and Ronin O'Connor and Ben Elliott to play more inside midfield. The first half was electric with both sides fighting and scraping for every inch, piling on the pressure around the football, we went into the half time break 20 points up knowing that we needed to keep the intensity up around the ball. We were outstanding in the 2nd half kicking 9 goals and restricting Peel to 3 goals and running out winners by 59 points. We travelled back down to New Choice Homes Park for the preliminary final.

Knowing that we needed to match East Fremantle's intensity around the ball, our boys got off to a flying start, kicking 8 goals to 2 in the first half. Jason Carter looked threatening in a new role in the forward line, kicking goals and limiting play maker Cameron Eardley's influence. A desperate East Fremantle fought back in the last quarter kicking 2 goals to 0 but we would run out winners by 28 points and book a place in the grand final. We faced a West Perth team that had the week off and knew we had to start well, given our boys were coming off a 6 day break. We started the game off well and created a lot of scoring opportunities, but we couldn't capitalise and went in at quarter time 15 points down. From there we were playing catch up but in the last quarter we gave ourselves a chance of winning when we kicked 2 goals in 5 minutes and closed the gap to 5 points. For the last 15 minutes it was a stalemate with both sides displaying a tough, contested style of football. A freak soccer goal from Dobson with a couple of minutes to go put the game out of reach and eventually we lost by 12 points.

A lot of positives came out of the year with several young players making the most of league opportunities. Oliver Sheldrick, Anthony Davis, Ben Elliott, Ben Edwards and Max Spyvee continue to develop and improve. Tyron Smallwood became a potent small forward in attack, Oliver Eastland's finals series was outstanding. Experienced players Bailey Rogers, Timm House and Jye Bolton played different roles at times to great effect. Declan Hardisty once again blanketed the opposition's best forward and captain Declan Mountford led by example both on and off the field.

- We played 42 players in the League side with 12 players making their League debuts.
- 96% of players were local zoned, once again leading the WAFL competition with the next best at 74%.
- Top 3 in this year's League B&F was Jye Bolton, Bailey Rogers and Ben Edwards.
- Top 3 in this year's Reserves B&F was Samuel Alvarez, Max Minear and Ben Elliott/ Oliver Sheldrick.
- We had 2 state representatives - Bailey Rogers and Ryan Lim.
- Declan Mountford played 2 games for WCE as a Covid top up player.
- Milestones achieved by Ryan Lim- 150 games, Bailey Rogers- 100 games, Callan England- 50 games and Tyron Smallwood- 50 games
- Retirees in Jack Beeck and Jared Hardisty.

A big thanks to all of our wonderful football support staff who contribute countless hours and truly have the club's best interest at heart. ## TALENT MANAGER

Another rollercoaster season has come to an end for the Claremont talent programs, with plenty to reflect on as we look to continue to develop and nurture our young brigade through their talent pathway journeys.

#### WAFL COLTS

Coming off three consecutive Grand Final appearances, our Colts program suffered a comparatively disappointing season this time around, missing the finals for the first time since 2018. Eventually finishing 6th on the ladder, one win outside the Top 5, we were left to rue a number of poor performances during two key patches of the season that left us with too much work to do in the closing rounds.

The highlight of the year undoubtedly came in Round 6 through an incredibly brave 1-point victory over eventual premier Peel Thunder on a cold Friday night in Mandurah. The season also saw plenty of opportunity provided to a range of young men, as we played a total of 57 players across our 16 games, including 31 debutants, 10 players from our Great Southern zone and 7 from our Kimberley zone.

A full list of individual award winners and state representatives from our Colts program features later in this report, but a special mention to the Top 3 in our Fairest & Best; Mitchell Barron, Josh Sukuroski and Max Mumme. Mitch (Interchange) and Josh (Full Back) were also rewarded with selection in the WAFL Colts Team of the Year, while Max spent the majority of the season playing up in our Reserves side. At the time of writing, we also have a few players in the mix to feature in the AFL National Draft – so I wish those boys all the best for the big event and hopefully their AFL careers to follow.

While faced with a challenging season first up, new Colts Coach Ashley Clancy is to be applauded for his efforts in the role this year, while I would also like to thank Ash's Assistant Coaches Ben Willett, Brendan Arundell, Brett Bowker, Chris Wallace and Ryan Pontifex, as well as Runners Matt Sofoulis & Chris Bandy. # HARDISTY HANGS UP HIS BOOTS

Few Claremont players in recent years have earned such admiration from club supporters as Jared Hardisty, a dynamic and fearless midfielder who has decided to hang up his boots after a wonderful 12-year association with the Tigers.

The 26-year-old Hardisty, a veteran of 98 senior matches with Claremont, will be sorely missed in the 2023 season while he experiences the latest chapter in his life as an electrician at a goldmine not far from Kalgoorlie.

A series of injuries have dogged his career over the past four years, and he is looking forward to a dramatic change of lifestyle and not being involved in football on a daily basis.

Hardisty has been a tough, uncompromising player and a fierce tackling machine on the football field, a robust competitor whose outstanding commitment has been the hallmark of his game. He has always shied away from the glamorous aspects of football and concentrates on doing the hard things like chasing, tackling, smothering the ball off the boot of an opponent and protecting his teammates.

A powerfully-built left-footer, Hardisty is a skilful player who reads the play expertly and gets his teammates involved with his brilliant use of deft handball. His 98 senior matches have earned him 961 kicks and 904 handpasses as well as a remarkable tally of 603 tackles.

"At the best and fairest night, it was announced as a retirement, but I'm calling it a little hiatus," he said as he set off on his journey as a FIFO worker. "I definitely haven't written myself off from coming back. I'm having a bit of a rest to see if I can get my mind and body right. I'd love to have the opportunity to play another season and in a bid for an elusive premiership. To play in a league premiership side is everyone's goal and dream.

"It wasn't an easy decision, made quickly or lightly. It is something I've had on my mind last season and for the coming season. I love the footy club and the people around the club. Claremont has been like a second home to me, and I've spent the past 12 years there meeting so many great people who make you feel so welcome.

"Just of late I have been feeling a bit physically and mentally drained and having a handful of injuries over the past couple of years has been quite frustrating. Tearing hamstrings on both legs took its toll on me mentally, and it made it tough coming back (to playing after injuries), losing fitness and touch.

"A friend of mine works on a goldmine site near Kalgoorlie, and he offered me a job. So, it's a good opportunity to change things up a bit."

Hardisty, a product of the Marist club, first became involved with Claremont as a member of the club's under-14's development squad, and he began with the colts side as a 16-year-old in 2012, and the year 2013 was a memorable one --- when he made his first senior appearance in a Fostel Cup match against Southport at Optus Stadium, was named in the WAFL Colts Team of the Year, was a member of Claremont's colts premiership side and won the club's fairest-and-best award.

He was a member of Western Australia's 18's side in 2014 and then was picked up by Hawthorn in the 2014 rookie draft. He spent the 2015 season training with Hawthorn and playing for the Box Hill senior and development sides before he was delisted at the end of the year.



"Being at Hawthorn was an unreal experience, and there were times when I was pinching myself when I was kicking the footy with Cyril Rioli in the warm-ups before training," said Hardisty. "It was also disappointing that my time there was cut short."

Hardisty returned to Perth, and he made his WAFL league debut with Claremont in the 2016 round one match against East Perth, alongside fellow-debutant Jye Bolton, who won the E. B. Cook Medal as the club's fairest-and-best player that year, with Hardisty finishing fourth. In 2018 Hardisty was second to Bolton in the Cook Medal, and he was third in 2020.

Serious damage to his right hamstring, received in a pre-season practice match, kept Hardisty on the sidelines for much of the 2019 season in which he managed just six league appearances.

Hardisty said that his role at Claremont had always been as an inside midfielder. "Just getting in and under and getting your hands dirty was what I loved," said Hardisty. "I get a kick out of looking after my mates because I know that if I look after them, then they'll look after you. It goes both ways, and this helps to build a lot of trust with your teammates."

A measure of Hardisty's leadership qualities was shown in 2021 when he was chosen as the club's co-captain with Declan Mountford. "I never dreamt of being captain," he said. "I really enjoyed it, but I think I wasn't quite ready for the role. I declined the role in 2022 because mentally I wasn't in the right head space for the role, though I continued as a member of the leadership group. Declan is just the perfect man for the job."

Hardisty said that he felt quite comfortable in announcing his retirement, stating that one of the chief reasons for his decision was that he had great faith in Ben Elliott and Ollie Sheldrick developing into outstanding midfielders.

"I feel happy to step away because I have so much faith in those young guys," he said. "I feel content that they will be able to play a similar role that I've played.

"I'm so thankful for my time at Claremont and all the people who have played a part in my career. Darcy Coffey was one of the first Claremont people I met when I went to the club in the under-14s, and he has been there the whole way and always supported me.

"I'm most thankful to Kepler Bradley and the coaches I've had through the years, and I'm most grateful for all the support I've had. I'm so thankful that I have been a part of Claremont for 12 years, and, hopefully, in the future, as well."

# BEECK CALLS TIME

There's been a lot of water flowing under the bridge since Jack Beeck made his league debut for Claremont in a round five match against Peel Thunder at Rushton Park on April 26, 2015.

The strongly-built left-footer quickly gained a reputation as a robust, strong and reliable back pocket specialist, who also excelled when stationed on a half-back flank and on a wing.

He began his career with the Tigers in 2012 as a member of the colts side, and he enjoyed early success as a member of the Ben Dyer-coached Claremont side which won the cots premiership in 2013, beating South Fremantle in a terrific match at Subiaco Oval.

However, his career has been blighted by injury and he has decided to retire after appearing in 150 matches for the Tigers --- 30 for the colts, 50 for the reserves and 70 for the league side.

The 27-year-old Beeck made his final appearance for Claremont as captain of the reserves side which lost to Subiaco in the preliminary final in September this year when he bowed out on a high note as one of the side's best players, taking four marks, having 17 kicks and three handpasses.

Beeck was a regular member of the league side in 2015 and 2016 when he played in 31 matches, but his football world came crashing down on him in November 2016 when he damaged the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee in a marking contest during a pre-season training session at the John XXIII playing fields.

This required a full knee reconstruction, and he missed the entire 2017 season. He made a full recovery and returned to action in 2018 when he played in 19 league matches and finished sixth in the fairest-and-best count.

Beeck continued in fine form, and everything appeared rosy after he added another 20 league matches to his tally in the 2019 season which ended with a loss to South Fremantle in the preliminary final.

But that match was to be his final appearance in the league side. He again damaged his ACL in his right knee in an intra club scratch match at Reva Fitness Stadium, an injury which kept him on the sidelines for the full 2020 season.

He made his long-awaited return in a reserves contest against Peel at Rushton Park in July 2021 and finished the season with eight games



for the reserves. He added another 18 reserves games in 2022 when his leadership qualities were of considerable benefit for the younger members of the side.

Beeck has also assisted in coaching roles at the club, and in 2018 he received a district Youth of the Year coaching award.

# BOLTON'S LIGHT SHINES BRIGHTLY

Claremont supporters have marvelled at the sheer brilliance of Jye Bolton over the past seven years, with the robust midfielder's mind-boggling list of achievements earning him the distinction of joining the ranks of the club's most decorated players.

Few players have made such an impact at Claremont as has the 30-year-old Bolton, whose skill, courage, commitment and endurance have endeared him to the fans.

Bolton, the league side's vice-captain in 2022, led by example and he was rewarded with a third E. B. Cook Medal as the side's fairest-and-best player.

He won the Cook Medal in his debut season in 2016 and again in 2018. He was also runner-up to Bailey Banfield in 2017, to Alec Waterman in 2020 and to Bailey Rogers in 2021.

Adding to his list of achievements are Sandover Medals in 2016 and 2018 as the fairest-and-best player in the WAFL competition. He has the remarkable record of finishing in the top six in the Sandover Medal voting in six consecutive seasons, from 2016 to 2021 (when he was runner-up to teammate Bailey Rogers). He finished sixth in 2017, fourth in 2019 and sixth in 2020.

Umpires have been so impressed with Bolton's superb performances that they have awarded him a total of 201 votes in his seven seasons with the Tigers.

For good measure, Bolton has also won the Simpson Medal four times, a record for a Claremont footballer. Three of his Simpson Medals were for his great efforts in interstate contests, two against South Australia and one against Tasmania, and for his excellence in the 2020 grand final when he had 35 disposals and seven inside 50s in the shattering three-point loss to South Fremantle at Fremantle Oval.

Bolton also suffered the great disappointment of playing his heart out at Leederville Oval on October 1 this year when West Perth beat the Tigers by 12 points in the grand final.

Winning the premiership in 2023 will be a major focus for Bolton, who has been chosen in the WAFL Team of the Year in each of his seven seasons with Claremont when he stood out with his contested ball efforts, elite running, contested marking, penetrating kicking and team lifting long bombs for goals.

The bulk of Bolton's career has been as a tough and fearless midfielder. But he also stood out in Claremont's final few matches in 2022 as a rebounding and creative half-back flanker. He is a genuine superstar who has delighted the fans in his 132 league appearances since he was recruited from the Werribee Tigers.

Bolton was born in Geelong and was taken by Collingwood in the 2011 rookie draft. He spent a season on Collingwood's list before being delisted at the end of the 2011 season. It remains one of football's most intriguing mysteries why no AFL club has drafted him after he has shone so brightly for Claremont year after year.

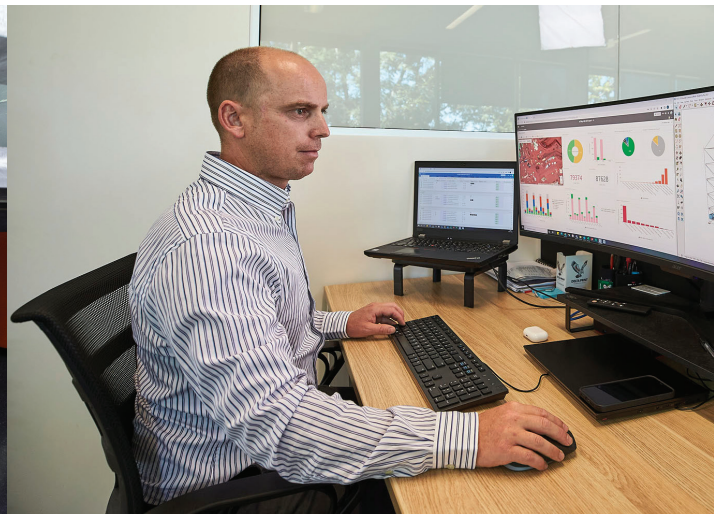

The fundraising activities and sponsorship of the Club continues to be important in providing much needed cash for the Club to effectively achieve its objectives.


**Significant Changes**

**Note 1. Significant accounting policies**

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

**New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted**

Claremont Football Club Inc. has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period and effective for an accounting period that begins on or after 1 July 2021. Any new revised or amended accounting standards or interpretations that are not set mandatory have not been early adopted.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact to the financial performance or position of the Association.

**Basis of preparation**

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosure Requirements and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA) and associated regulations, as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

*Historical cost convention*

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

*Critical accounting estimates*

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying Claremont Football Club Inc.'s accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

**Revenue recognition**

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration with the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customers such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of the variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

*Sales revenue*

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

*Donations*

Donations are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

*Grants*

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with.

*Interest*

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial assets.

*Other revenue*

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

**Borrowing Costs**

Borrowing costs are recognised as an expense when incurred.

**Leases**

The determination of whether an arrangement is or contains a lease is based on the substance of the arrangement and requires an assessment of whether the fulfilment of the arrangement is dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets and the arrangement conveys a right to use the asset.

*(i) Club as a lessee*

Finance leases, which transfer to the club substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased item, are recognised at the inception of the lease at the fair value of the leased property or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charges and reduction of the lease liability so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognised as an expense in profit or loss. Capitalised leased assets are depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset and the lease term if there is no reasonable certainty that the Club will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term.

**Leases (continued)**

Operating lease payments associated with short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised on a straight-line basis as an expense in profit or loss. Short term leases are leases with a lease term of 12 months or less. Low-value assets comprise of office equipment.

**Current and non-current classification**

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in Claremont Football Club Inc.'s normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Claremont Football Club Inc.'s normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

**Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

**Trade and other receivables**

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any provision for impairment.

**Inventories**

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Inventories are accounted for at purchase cost on a first in first out basis.

**Investments and other financial assets**

Investments and Financial assets in the scope of AASB 139 *Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement* are classified as either financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, available for sale investments or loans and receivables. When financial assets are recognised initially, they are measured at fair value. The Club determines the classification of its financial assets at initial recognition.

*(i) Classification of financial instruments*

The Association classifies its financial assets into the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured at fair value (either through other comprehensive income, or through profit or loss); and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The classification depends on the Association's business model for managing financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial assets' cash flows.

The Association classifies its financial liabilities at amortised cost unless it has designated liabilities at fair value through profit or loss or is required to measure liabilities at fair value through profit or loss such as derivative liabilities.

*(ii) Financial assets measured at amortised cost*

*Debt instruments*

Investments in debt instruments are measured at amortised cost where they have:

- contractual terms that give rise to cash flows on specified dates, that represent solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding; and
- are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by holding to collect contractual cash flows.

**Investments and other financial assets (continued)**

These debt instruments are initially recognised at fair value plus directly attributable transactions costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost. The measurement of credit impairment is based on the three-stage expected credit loss model described below in note (c) Impairment of financial assets.

*(a) Financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income*

*Equity instruments*

Investment in equity instruments that are neither held for trading nor contingent consideration recognised by the Association in a business combination to which AASB 3 "Business Combination" applies, are measured at fair value through other comprehensive income, where an irrevocable election has been made by management.

Amounts presented in other comprehensive income are not subsequently transferred to profit or loss. Dividends on such investments are recognised in profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents a recovery of part of the cost of the investment.

*(b) Items at fair value through profit or loss*

Items at fair value through profit or loss comprise:

- \* items held for trading;
- \* items specifically designated as fair value through profit or loss on initial recognition; and
- \* debt instruments with contractual terms that do not represent solely payments of principal and interest.

Financial instruments held at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognised at fair value, with transaction costs recognised in the income statement as incurred. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value and any gains or losses are recognised in the income statement as they arise.

Where a financial asset is measured at fair value, a credit valuation adjustment is included to reflect the credit worthiness of the counterparty, representing the movement in fair value attributable to changes in credit risk.

*Financial instruments held for trading*

A financial instrument is classified as held for trading if it is acquired or incurred principally for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near term, or forms part of a portfolio of financial instruments that are managed together and for which there is evidence of short-term profit making, or it is a derivative not in a qualifying hedge relationship.

*Financial instruments designated as measured at fair value through profit or loss*

Upon initial recognition, financial instruments may be designated as measured at fair value through profit or loss. A financial asset may only be designated at fair value through profit and loss if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces measurement or recognition inconsistencies (i.e. eliminates an accounting mismatch) that would otherwise arise from measuring financial assets or liabilities on a different basis.

A financial liability may be designated at fair value through profit or loss if it eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch or:

- \* if a host contract contains one or more embedded derivatives; or
- if financial assets and liabilities are both managed and their performance evaluated on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy.

Where a financial liability is designated at fair value through profit or loss, the movement in fair value attributable to changes in the Association's own credit quality is calculated by determining the changes in credit spreads above the observable market interest rates and is presented separately in other comprehensive income.

*(c) Impairment of financial assets*

The Association applies a three-stage approach to measuring expected credit losses (ECLs) for the following categories of financial assets that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss:

- \* debt instruments measured at amortised cost and fair value through other comprehensive income;
- \* loan commitments; and
- \* financial guarantee contracts.

No ECL is recognised on equity investments.

*Determining the stage for impairment*

At each reporting date, the Association assesses whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk for exposures since initial recognition by comparing the risk of default occurring over the remaining expected life from the reporting date and the date of initial recognition. The Association considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort for this purpose. This includes quantitative and qualitative information and also, forward- looking analysis.

An exposure will migrate through the ECL stages as asset quality deteriorates. If, in a subsequent period, asset quality improves and also reverses any previously assessed significant increase in credit risk since origination, then the provision for doubtful debts reverts from lifetime ECL to 12-months ECL. Exposures that have not deteriorated significantly since origination are considered to have a low credit risk. The provision for doubtful debts for these financial assets is based on a 12-months ECL. When an asset is uncollectible, it is written off against the related provision. Such assets are written off after all the necessary procedures have been completed and the amount of the loss has been determined. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off reduce the amount of the expense in the income statement.

The Association assesses whether the credit risk on an exposure has increased significantly on an individual or collective basis. For the purposes of a collective evaluation of impairment, financial instruments are grouped on the basis of shared credit risk characteristics, taking into account instrument type, credit risk ratings, date of initial recognition, remaining term to maturity, industry, geographical location of the borrower and other relevant factors.

*(d) Recognition and derecognition of financial instruments*

A financial asset or financial liability is recognised in the balance sheet when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument, which is generally on trade date. Loans and receivables are recognised when cash is advanced (or settled) to the borrowers.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are recognised initially at fair value. All other financial assets are recognised initially at fair value plus directly attributable transaction costs.

The Association derecognises a financial asset when the contractual cash flows from the asset expire or it transfers its rights to receive contractual cash flows from the financial asset in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are transferred. Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by the Association is recognised as a separate asset or liability.

A financial liability is derecognised from the balance sheet when the Association has discharged its obligation or the contract is cancelled or expires.

*(e) Offsetting*

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is presented in the balance sheet when the Association has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

**Property, plant and equipment**

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

**Property, plant and equipment (continued)**

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the Claremont Football Club Inc. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

**Impairment of non-financial assets**

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

**Interest-bearing loans and borrowings**

All loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received less and directly attributable transaction costs.

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised.

**Trade and other payables**

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Claremont Football Club Inc. prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

**Employee benefits**

*Short-term employee benefits*

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

*Other long-term employee benefits*

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

*Defined contribution superannuation expense*

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

**Fair value measurement**

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

**Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

**Comparative Figures**

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current year.

**Going Concern**

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which contemplates the continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

For the year ended 31 October 2022, the Club generated a surplus of \$155,833 (2021: \$161,225) and had cash inflows from operating activities of \$222,022 (2021: \$341,571).

The Club has overdraft facilities of \$450,000 which was undrawn at the balance date.

The Board has prepared a budget, which indicates that the Club will have sufficient cash flows to meet all commitments and working capital requirements for the 12 month period from the date of signing this financial report. On this basis the Board is satisfied that the going concern basis of preparation is appropriate.

**Note 2. Critical accounting judgments, estimates and assumptions**

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgments and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgments, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgments and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgments, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

**Estimation of useful lives of assets**

Claremont Football Club Inc. determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

**Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets**

Claremont Football Club Inc. assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to Claremont Football Club Inc. and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

**Employee benefits provision**

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

**Redevelopment Activities**

In 2017 the Club has completed redevelopment activities at Claremont Oval pursuant to an agreement with LandCorp whereby the parties have agreed to the cancellation of the Club's lease, and granted freehold title of the Clubhouse land to the Club on a conditional use basis. Redevelopment Activities were funded by Landcorp, up to an amount of \$16.5m, and have not been reflected in this financial report.

As part of the redevelopment, and pursuant to an agreement between the Club, the Town of Claremont and the purchaser of the land immediately to the north of the Club's facilities, the Club was entitled to 81 car bays. In 2021, the construction of the 81 car bays in the basement of the building to the north of the Club's facilities was completed. The Club made a contribution (funded by Landcorp) of \$1m to the cost of their construction. The value of these car bays has not been reflected in this financial report.

**Maintenance Fund**

During 2018, the excess land to the North of the Club facilities was sold by the Government and \$1.5m of the proceeds was granted to the Club pursuant to the terms of a Trust Deed.

Under the terms of the Trust Deed, the Club is required to keep these proceeds, and any interest earned, in an auditable Trust Account. The funds held in the Trust Account (separate to the financial statements) may only be applied to the costs of repairing, maintaining, and renewing the Club's premises in accordance with an Asset Management Plan that has been approved by the Government.

During the year, \$102,190 was expended on such repairs and maintenance. Of this amount, \$7,569.23 was sourced from the Trust Account, with the balance being funded by operating cashflows. At year end, the closing balance of the Trust Account was \$1,500,000.





## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF CLAREMONT FOOTBALL CLUB INC.

### Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial report, of Claremont Football Club Inc. ("the Club"), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 31 October 2022, statement of changes in equity, the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income and the statement of cash flows for the year ended on that date, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the directors' declaration.

In our opinion, except for the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the financial report of Claremont Football Club Inc. is in accordance with the club constitution, including:

- (i) giving a true and fair view of the company's financial position as at 31 October 2022 and of its performance for the year ended on that date; and
- (ii) complying with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosure Requirements, the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA) and associated regulations.

### Basis for Qualified Opinion

#### Revenue Recognition

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable for the Club to maintain an effective system of internal control over cash receipts and payments until their initial entry in the accounting records. Our audit relating to these items was therefore limited to the amounts recorded in the accounts.

#### Redevelopment Activities

We draw attention to Note 7 in the financial report with respect to the Club's redevelopment activities completed in 2017. The funds received and spent on these activities have not been accounted for in this financial report, as such our audit procedures have been limited to that presented in the financial report. As a result, we have not obtained appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for an audit opinion on the redevelopment activities and the effect of these has not been determined on the financial performance, position and cash flows of the Club.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report is free from material misstatement. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the Club in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's *APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

## Other Information

The directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Club's annual report for the year ended 31 October 2022, but does not include the financial report and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial report does not cover the other information and accordingly we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial report, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial report or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

## Directors' Responsibility for the Financial Report

The directors of the Club are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Club's constitution and Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015 and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The directors' responsibility also includes such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the directors are responsible for assessing the ability of the Club to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Club or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the entity's financial reporting process.

## Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. - Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities within the Club to express an opinion on the financial report. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the Club audit. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

We communicate with the directors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide the directors with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.
